**CANNOT SHIP TO BELGIANS NOW; CASH DONATIONS ONLY**

The Belgian Relief Committee has issued a notice that they can accept no more contributions of goods, but that cash gifts still are needed as much as ever. The committee has not been accepting goods for several months, but it is only recently that they managed to forward the last dozen cases which had accumulated. There is now no means by which shipments can be made from Canada to Belgium and it was only by forwarding the goods to New York to go forward with a steamship which the American commission was sending off that the local committee managed to arrange transportation and they cannot depend on being able to do this again. The committee has been advised that the pressing need is not for gifts of food or clothing, but for money which the commission can expend to the best advantage in relieving the wants of the suffering people.

**BATTALION WILL WINTER HERE**

Companies at Fredericton, Woodstock and Sussex—Winter Quarters Arranged For Troops in Canada

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—Plans for the winter quarters of the 46,000 to 50,000 troops who will be in training in Canada this winter were approved by the militia council this afternoon. The work of fitting up the various buildings selected is now being rushed under the direction of Lieut.-Col. A. P. Deroche, director of works and buildings, and by the middle of next month most of the men will be comfortably settled for the winter either in the various command armories or in other large suitable buildings acquired by the department. Temporary cooking and sleeping accommodations will be established in each building, thus making outside billeting unnecessary, excepting in a few instances where some of the men may have to be lodged elsewhere.

In accordance with the recruiting plan for rural centres, announced by the minister of militia yesterday, local arrangements will be made for the temporary billeting at local centres of small units as recruited.

In Quebec province the centres will be Montreal, where the Northern Electric building will be used; Quebec and Lévis.

One Battalion in St. John.

In the maritime provinces, two battalions will be quartered at the I. C. R. pier, No. 2, Halifax; one battalion in the St. John drill hall; one heavy battery in the Charlottetown agricultural buildings; one company in Sussex; one company in Woodstock and two companies in Fredericton.

Western troops will be quartered at Winnipeg, Regina, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Port Arthur, Fort William, Sault Ste. Marie, Brandon, Victoria, Vancouver, New Westminster, Nanaimo, Vernon, Kamloops, Edmonton, Calgary, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat and Red Deer.

**20,000 Recruits in Five Weeks.**

Figures of recruiting in five of the nine military districts in Canada show that no less than 18,000 recruits have enlisted in the five weeks ended with Sept. 11. This does not include the Toronto or London districts, which would bring the total up to over 20,000.

**Some Changes in Canadian Commands.**

Some interesting changes in the composition and commands of the Canadian army corps, which is now in France, are announced tonight in a cable from General Alderson, commanding the army corps, to General Sir Sam Hughes, minister of militia. Corps troops over and above the two regular divisions have been formed by authority of Sir John French. These include Col. C. A. Smart, cavalry brigade; the 42nd Montreal Highlanders, under Col. Cantlie; the 46th Edmonton Battalion, under Colonel Griesbach; and the Royal Canadian Regiment, under Colonel Macdonell.

The command of the force will be given to Brigadier-General Mercer, who formerly commanded with great credit the First Canadian brigade.

The place of General Mercer will be taken by Lieut.-Col. Garnett B. Hughes, formerly brigade major of the 10th Highland Battalion. Colonel Hughes, who won his D. S. O. after St. Julien, is a son of General Sir Sam Hughes.

**WILL MOBILIZE 88TH AT SUSSEX?**

Lieut. Col. G. W. Fowler Assumes Command Immediately—Local Recruiting Campaign—Defence and Resources

Lieut. Col. G. W. Fowler, M. P., for Kings-Albert, will reach Sussex today from Ottawa with full authority to organize a fourth New Brunswick battalion, the 88th at Sussex.

Another recruiting rally will be held in the city tomorrow evening in the seamen's institute, while another meeting is planned for Thursday, F. E. Williams has given the use of Victoria Hall, city road, for meeting purposes.

Tomorrow evening the chief speaker will be Rev. Father F. L. Carney, of St. Dunstan's, Fredericton, formerly of St. John, one of the best platform speakers in the province, and as he has not been heard here for some time, many will doubt be glad to renew acquaintance with him. Rev. and Hon. Captain Harrison, chaplain of the 64th, will also speak again to a St. John audience on that occasion.

On Thursday the chief speaker will be John T. Hawke, of the Moncton Transcript, also one of the most interesting speakers and anti-German writers in Canada.

**Local Committee Work.**  
The committee of defence and resources are keeping open their office in Prince William street with good results. Many people call daily in reply to the letters that the committee have sent out and it is felt that the register that is being kept of offers and desires is meeting with success. Yesterday a girl in the city whose birthday falls on Sept. 30, having heard that the committee was spending a large sum on postage, offered to give up the present of a birthday ring to enable her to send the money to the committee to help defray the cost

of postage. The committee very properly ask all young men in the city who have not yet replied to their letter whether they are going to waste the two cents of that young lady's gift.

The engineering corps that is now drilling in the armoury on Tuesdays and Fridays has a roster of seventy-five names and a large proportion of the members are able to drill twice a week. Several of these young men have enlisted for overseas service.
