LANCASTER TALKS

Choice of Three Plans-A Committee is Appointed to Report.

At a meeting of the Board of Health vesterday it was decided to enforce the regulations requiring the installation of proper sanitary appliances where sewer connections were available.

Dr. H. L. Abramson reported that five tests had been made of the city water and all had been satisfactory. Mrs. Armstrong, school nurse, was granted a month's leave of absence on account of ill health. Miss Coates presented the report on child welfare work showing that 361 child welfare visits had been paid and 44 new babies had been added to the register.

Dr. T. Fred Johnston, dairy and food inspector, submitted his report for the month and told of visits to slaughter houses. Miss Alice Hegan presented a report of the anti-tuberculosis work. An exceptionally large number of new cases were examined during the month, forty-two adults and seventy-nine children, a total of 121 new cases. The

forty-two adults and seventy-nine children, a total of 121 new cases. The total number of cases on the register was 356, 180 adults and 176 children. The nurses made 274 visits and 121 patients attended the clinics. Five patients were receiving milk and eighteen were discharged as non-tubercular.

JAPANESE BUY MANY TRACTORS Tokio, August 10.—(By Mail)—
Tractors, chiefly American made, are supplanting hand labor on the farms of Western Japan. There are now 13,-1000 of these on farms in Okayama elone, where farm labor is scarce.

MYSTERY IN A COFFEE BEAN.

Importer Tells What a Chemical Analysis Revealed.

New York, Sept. 14.—Just back from a business trip to Brazil, George Thompson, a New York importer, who returned on the Lamport & Holt liner Fan-America, says that it seemed neccessary for him to go to South America to learn something about coffee, although he had been drinking it all his life. In Rio Janeiro, he said, some merchants, for trade purposes, had a chemical analysis made of the coffee bean. This revealed, he said, that a coffee bean held more things than he had suspected. There is a lot of fibre in it, some chaff, from 2 to 3 per cent. of volatile oils and a host of fats, waxes, resins, glucosides, and so on. Some of the things, like the oils, give well-made coffee its delightful flavor. Others are bitter or astringent.

The scientific way to make the best cups of coffee, Mr. Thompson said, is to extract the pleasant things and leave the unpleasant things behind. Boil coffee and you get its bitter ingredients along with its smooth oils—and a flavor of tin, silver, aluminum or copper if you use a metal coffee pot. Coffee should never be boiled, and it is improved when no metal is used.

Try this method, Mr. Thompson says, and see if you don't agree with the scientists in voting the drink better than coffee made the old way.

First boil the water (in a glass vessel if you have one) and then allow it to stand a minute or two a little below the boiling point. Now put in freshly ground coffee and stir it (preferably with a glass rod) until all the particles are wet, when they sink. Pour the coffee off the grounds and you have a beverage with body enough to satisfy people who like the strongest coffee, and yet with a delicacy of flavor that delights the most exacting.
