Star Sprinter Only Finished  
Sixth—Murchison Wins  
Dash.

Newark, Feb. 9.—Jole Ray, Chicago distance star, not only failed in an attempt to lower the track record but was decisively beaten in a handicap race at one mile, one of the features of the Newark A. C. games. Ray finished sixth in the race which was won by A. Mack, of New York, with a handicap of 125 yards. The Chicagoan's time, 4:40 3-5 seconds, was his slowest in several seasons and about 10 seconds under the track record.

Ray tried hard to cut down the big advantages possessed by his rivals but lacked his customary brilliant finish and was outwitted in the last 50 yards by a Newark youth, W. Hendricks, who landed fourth place.
