

Frenchwoman Who Shot Broker Calm As Trial Ends; May Get Death

New York, March 7.—Whether the shooting to death of Oscar Martelliere, insurance broker, on October 16 last, was accidental homicide, committed in a moment of temporary derangement, or deliberate murder planned and executed by a woman scorned, will be determined by the jury now considering the case.

Testimony to show that Martelliere led to Mrs. Saludes about her husband, with the result that she divorced him, and that he then stole her business property, her home and her honor, will be considered.

Though at times during the trial, whenever mention of her relations with Martelliere was made, Mrs. Saludes became hysterical and sobbed, showing great emotional strain, she became calmer as the trial proceeded, and was comparatively resigned to the jury's decision as the trial came to a close.

"He lied to me," she said. "I believe he was untrue to me, and that he then stole my business property, her home and her honor, will be considered."

Throughout the testimony of other witnesses she was calm except when Martelliere's name was mentioned, then she shuddered, and clenched her hands. She declared that she was happily married until her husband went to Europe and Martelliere began his attentions, and convinced her that her husband was a thief and unworthy of her. This, she said, was the beginning of her downfall.

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"WILL TO LOAF" IS TAUGHT PUPILS

Condemns Lax Methods of Education as Harmful to Children

Praises German System — Engineer, Great Believer in Education, Lauds Industrial School.

New York, March 7.—A "will to loaf" is being developed in the minds of the American school children by lax methods of teaching, according to Dwight T. Farnham, Consulting Industrial Engineer of New York City, who spoke before the Bureau of Education meeting recently at the Hotel McAlpin.

He compared the conditions existing in the industrial schools of Germany and France with those in the United States. The "will to work," he said, was instilled in the German almost from the time he is born.

"The German boy is carefully watched," said Mr. Farnham. "He is given psycho-technical tests. It is evident that his mentality fits him to be a hewer of wood or a drawer of such subjects as will increase his manual dexterity. If he shows signs of intelligence he is transferred to classes which will fit him for a formanshop or clerical position. If he is slow, he is given a manual training, to our pleasure in life and to the work of skilled mechanics."

"In America we train our youngsters to be ladies and gentlemen and instill the 'will to loaf' in them by sending them to the universities. The result is a screen star's conception of 'This is life! America is a rich country and as long as we can afford to bring them up that way let's give them all we can.'—Lord bless 'em! But some day we will have to educate children in such a way that their training will fit them to do the work of their fathers or we will have to follow the Ford plan of breaking down all work into such simple elements that untrained farmer boys and the way youth of our cities can do the work of skilled mechanics."

"I am a great believer in general education. It adds to the breadth of our viewpoint, to our pleasure in life and to our success. If we pass above a certain rank in the industrial organization which we call modern civilization, it is doubtful if we will have to adopt the expediency of France and Germany in this generation. But it is well to examine the 'competitiveness' of the general public and to adopt whatever we can without detriment to the souls or bodies of our race."

Twelve years of English in the public schools in place of some of the courses in advertising and selling were recommended to the Bureau of Education by Ralph S. Butler, advertising manager of the United States Rubber Company. Retail selling, according to Mr. Butler, can only be taught "on the job."

W. H. Leflingwell, president of the Leflingwell-Ream Company, commented in an address during the afternoon session upon the general lack of intelligence and interest of automatic, unthinking labor and suggested the plan of scientific management which contemplates and involves a general rise in the intelligence of all members of a business organization.

"There is no reason," said Mr. Leflingwell, "why an office boy should not understand the general principles of business, as well as the manager. No reason why a typist should be mentally limited to pounding the keys, no reason why a clerk should be a mere automaton—a human adding machine—no reason why a single member of any organization should not see what the universal purpose of the business is and how its parts work harmoniously together."

"Getting this broad, general view of the process even without mastery of any of the details would prevent that sense of bewilderment that soon develops into automatic, unthinking, mechanical effort on the part of our young people who are hustled into offices utterly untrained in any general perception of what business fundamentally is, and with nothing more than a mechanical education, such as exercising a typewriter."

VERY VALUABLE MODERN PAINTING

"Judea Capta," Measuring Eighteen Feet by Twelve Depicts Triumph of Titus — A Hungarian Masterpiece.

New York, March 7.—The Anderson Galleries will exhibit on March 12 what is said to be the most valuable painting that has been offered for private sale in America in recent years. It is a huge canvas, measuring 18 feet by 12 feet, and is expected to bring \$100,000.

"Judea Capta, or the Triumph of Titus," is the title of the painting which is the work of Ivo Koves, a Hungarian artist, who died penniless during the war, leaving a destitute widow and children.

Koves a quarter of a century ago was one of the great Hungarian artists. Although his fame did not reach America, it traveled through Hungary and the adjoining countries and reached the art centre of Paris. Hungarian critics are said to have heaped praise upon his masterpiece, over which he labored for three years, and which he considered his life's work.

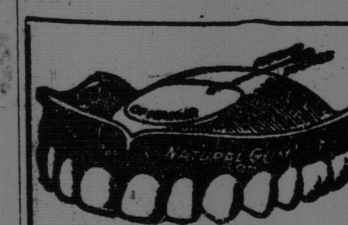
Arthur Lasslow, whose studio is at 219 St. John Street, has bought the painting for the Anderson Galleries. The picture shows the Roman triumph of Titus over Jerusalem, and the dispersal of the Hebrew Nation, is one of the most magnificent that has been offered at private sale in many years, said Mrs. Mollie Higgins Smith, who is in charge of the exhibition at the Anderson Galleries. Mrs. Smith asserted that only a Rembrandt, and a very unusual one, could command as high a figure as Koves's canvas.

Koves's painting deals with the crowning joy in Titus's life, when he was received in Rome by the Senate and populace as a conquering hero after destroying Jerusalem and making captive her sons and daughters.

The picture shows the Roman forum, with the Capitulum of Jupiter, the Roman Senate and the arches of the triumphal procession. In the foreground the captive daughters of Israel, clad in the rich garments which they had been compelled to do for their appearance before the Senate. They appear filled with grief. The artist placed Titus in a triumphal chariot rose-bedecked and drawn by white horses.

On each side of the procession, all Rome is gathered to view the return of their hero. The crowds extend to the very steps of the Capitolium. The nobles among the Roman spectators are either on the stairs of the Temple of Jove or the Senate building.

Ivo Koves was born in 1859 and left his native Hungarian village, an orphan at the age of 12. He was brought from town to town and finally found employment in a leather shop in the capital city. He devoted his leisure to painting and, through the help of several philanthropists, attended the Academy of Art. Then, with the aid of Karl Pulsky, Director of the Na-

national Art Gallery, he proceeded to Paris, where for three years he studied under Fleury, Laurens, Le Rous and others, and his talents received the recognition of the teachers at the Academie des Beaux-Arts. From Paris he went to Germany.

"Splendid Before His Judges," which is owned by Paul Sendor, Liberal member of the Hungarian Parliament, won for Koves the recognition of the late Emperor Francis Joseph. This painting was twice rejected by art juries in Budapest. Angered, Koves thrust it behind some discarded canvases in his studio. Just before the annual exhibition in 1898, his wife and Lasslow smuggled it out of the house and submitted it again. It was hung, and on

INVESTIGATION LIKELY INTO DEATH OF SYDNEY MAN

Sydney, N. S., March 7.—The Attorney General's Department will probably be asked to investigate the death of Joseph MacDonnell, 21, who died at a Glace Bay Hospital yesterday from the effects of a beating received several days ago.
