Norfolk's Striking Farmers Sturdy, Self-Reliant Folk

London Journalist Describes Characteristics of Industrious Laborers Who Are Now Defying Landowners.

London, April 10.—(By Mail.)—“What type of man is the agricultural laborer of Norfolk?” asks Tom Straw, writing in The London Daily News.

“There are at present some 10,000 of them on strike for better conditions of

life, or rather to prevent conditions becoming worse,” he says. “These Norfolk laborers are not wholly inarticulate, though they cannot express themselves quite as well as townspeople would. At Norwich, one of them told me, ‘they calls us clods, but we’re not that; we feeds most of ‘em.’ But the townsman does not understand because he seldom comes to grips with the question where

Rule of Neutrality Shown in Animal Life by Scientist

Johannesburg, April 10.—(By Mail.)—“Far too much has been made of the old tooth-and-claw theory of nature,” said Professor J. Arthur Thomson, in a lecture quoted by “The Johannesburg Star.”

Professor Thomson thought that no naturalist yet had done anything like justice to the way in which creatures worked or no immediately profitable or pleasurable end, but for the good and safety of their progeny, of their kind and race.

His lecture was concerned with “The Drama of Animal Life,” and first he drew a vivid picture of the changing stage on which the drama was played out: the smoking, hot, cinder-crusted earth, an impossible home for any living creature; then the water vapor condensing into depressions; then the making of the great sea, teeming with microscopic organisms—the primeval flora and fauna; then the dry land appearing, with the emergence of life from the sea to the land. The life that appeared was not a noble and finer form of life, but a life of struggle and hunger.

From his great knowledge of the ways of living things—a knowledge that ranges easily from the whole to the molecule—Dr. Thomson told stories illustrating these two aspects of the drama of animal life: the ant-lion trapping its prey; the blackcock and their love jousting; the courtship of the fireflies; the staid dancing and ant-dancing for the amusement of fascinated larks; the time should come to jump in and seize his prey.

He also told the wonderful story of the migration of eels, and of the leaf-cutting ants. These ants for many years have been known to go to unburied graves and to come home in squads, every member of which bears on its thorax a circular piece of leaf bitten from a tree. Only recently, Dr. Thomson said, had the use of the leaves been discovered. An ant-hill was broken open, and it was found that the ants were chewing the leaves into a paste. On the heaps of paste grows a particular kind of fungus, quite unknown elsewhere, on which the ants live. When the queen ant flies away to start a new community she takes a pile of the fungus underneath her chin, so that on the chewed leaves in the new home she may start a new growth.

“No need either for despair should the supply dry up occasionally so long as it is renewed from time to time. I have in mind a certain ditch which meandered through a certain property situated in one of our home counties. On an average it was not more than two or three yards wide throughout its length, but in its extreme southerly limit it ran through a miniature valley or depression which most conveniently lent itself to the purposes contemplated.
