It was his opinion that the chief cause, among many others, for Indian discontent was the attitude assumed by discontent was the attitude assumed by the great majority of the Anglo-Indian mercantile people, who had gone out to India with the hope of amassing fortunes quickly. Indian employes were treated generously but in far too many cases they were treated arrogantly and harshly. High places in the Indian services were filled by Englishmen. This bred discontent. The boorish attitude of many of the army officers reflected on the whole force and the government was blamed.


