KEEN INTEREST IN ORANGE WEEK. Merchants of St. John are evidencing keen interest in the six-day celebration of "orange week" to be held in this city next week. Recent advices from California confirm the announcement that special shipment of the fruit would be received on the local markets and record sales are looked for by dealers.

"Orange weeks" are being celebrated in all larger cities in the United States and are conducted under the direction of representatives of the California Fruit Growers' Exchange, the non-profit agency through which the crops of 10,500 California orange and lemon growers are shipped.

The purpose of the celebration is to remind the public of the health and food properties of the fruit. Scientific study has revealed numerous new facts regarding the fruit and these will be shown by placards, banners and special window displays during the week.

The fact that oranges are protected from germs and foreign substances by a thick outer layer of skin is pointed out as a reason for their purity. Physicians are recognizing the importance of the fruit in the diet and many are advocating them as a tonic and regulator to the system.

RETIREMENT OF CIVIL SERVANTS. Report in Commons on the Operations Under the Calder Act. Ottawa, April 12—(Canadian Press)—Since the coming into effect of the Calder act, for the superannuation and retirement of aged members of the civil service, on July 1 of last year, 1,599 employees of sixty-five years and over have been reported upon by the various department heads. Of this number, 660 were recommended for retirement, either from ill health, advanced age, by personal request or otherwise. Seventy-two of this number were contributors to the civil service superannuation and retirement fund.

Of those superannuated, 211 appealed and practically all of these protested against the retiring allowance which was awarded them. This information was given in a return brought down in the house yesterday.

At the close of the calendar year ninety-four retirements had been completed and the civil service commission, which had the work in hand, was hearing appeals as rapidly as possible. Four employees under sixty-five were retired under the provisions of the order-in-council covering retirement, which was approved in last July. There were reports on seventy-nine employees under sixty-five who were employed in the various government departments.

FREDERICK POST OFFICE MAN UNDER ARREST. (Canadian Press Despatch). Frederick, April 11—George F. Ferguson, a clerk at the Frederick post office, was arrested shortly before 2:30 o'clock this afternoon by Patrolman Murray of the police department on a warrant sworn out by post office department officials. The clerk was later admitted to bail in \$400.

CHARITABLE WORK OF ST. MONICA'S. Reports of Many Generous Gifts Submitted at Meeting of the Society. Ottawa, April 11—Members of the house of commons and the senate were memorialized today by representatives of civil servants all over Canada with a statement of the under-paid condition of the public service and the necessity for correcting a state of affairs which they said must affect the business of Canada as a nation. The memorial contains a list of the charges in the case of living since 1908. To keep pace with the increased cost since the salary schedules were based would require a fifty per cent increase in salaries this year and \$600 per annum, in addition, according to the memorial.

In the mock trial James Brown was the presiding judge, M. McLaughlin, clerk of the court; Percy Logan, counsel for the prosecution; Fred Hamilton, counsel for the defence; Edward Parks was the prisoner.

RETURNS FROM EUROPEAN TRIP. Among the passengers who arrived here yesterday afternoon on the C. P. O. S. liner Victorian was J. J. McGowan, of this city, who has been in France and Belgium in connection with the C. P. O. S. work of educating their officials there to issue through tickets to any place in Canada or the United States.

WRECKED CREW AWAY. The fifty-six Lascares and Chinese, members of the crew of the wrecked steamer, City of Colombo, were transported from here in bond last evening through to the United States via Montreal. Arrangements for their transportation were made by J. T. Knight and Company, local agents for the vessel. The men were paid off here in American currency, were placed in a special car, under guard and in charge of John Richards. Many of the Lascares are going straight through to Calcutta while others will join the crews of other vessels.
