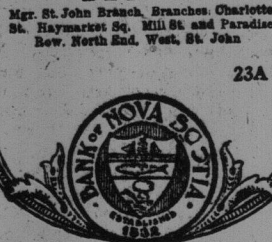

Iron radiators, chestnut, extract cork, chrome ore, fuel economizers for boilers, goldbeaters skin, guestbook, dry white lead, hide clippings, iron or steel wire, paraffin, pigskins, quibros, extract, railway sleepers, railway springs, railway wheels, railway construction material, resins, lead, coated sheets, silk manufactures, solid glucose, spirits, except whiskey, wine, wire rope, teleplates and tinplates.

With reference to the import of material into the United Kingdom, the commissioner is informed that licenses will be necessary for brushes, brooms, buttons, cotton piece goods, gloves of leather and fabric, gas mantles, vegetable tape.

The prohibition of the importation of bacon, lard, hams and hardwood has been relaxed.

New Silver Minimum.

London, March 25.—The government has fixed a new minimum price for silver, dating from today. It is equivalent to the current rate of exchange, to 95 cents per standard ounce.

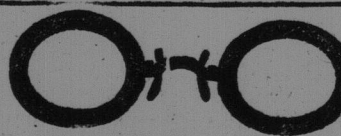
