While playing yesterday with William Smith and Gordon Mann, Stanley Hope, six-year-old son of Thomas Hope of 58 Thorne Avenue, was drowned in Marsh Creek. The two other lads had gone ashore, but he continued playing in the boat in which they had been. He was carried along by the current, and standing up, lost his balance. The tide carried him through the sluice gates and though he fought hard against the force of

water, the little fellow was drowned. An alarm from box 421 called the fire department but it was too late. The body was found by Ernest Lee and taken to the father's home.

Stanley Hope is survived by his father and mother, by five brothers—George, Hemmie, Arthur, Benjamin and Edward—and by one sister, Alice. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the father's residence, 58 Thorne Avenue.
