A NOBLE RECORD TO LOOK BACK ON

What East End Improvement League Has Accomplished This Year NOW FOR FOOTBALL

Big Skating Rink Will Be Made as Soon as Frost and Snow Come—The Children Have Their Share of Attention

With the best playground in St. John, a record of an unbroken season of good baseball since July 2; a four team soccer league ready to play early in October; a fine grandstand seating 800, and material to enlarge it for another 300 or 400; with eight swings and some teeters for children; and with a big outdoor skating rink in prospect for the winter, the East End Improvement League, organized last spring, is now easily first among the three leagues in the matter of work accomplished.

The dump in the old shipyard has been converted into a large playground, with a screen behind the catcher, and another screen behind first base. Four ball teams have played a fine series of games there, and there have been games with teams from Hampton, Moncton and St. Stephen, as well as St. Peter's, the Wolves, and other city teams.

The East End Improvement League was organized at a small meeting held in Thorne Lodge Hall, Rev. R. I. McKim was elected president; Rev. A. L. Telford, treasurer, and Henry McEwen, secretary.

Superintendent Nichols of the cotton mill was a staunch helper. He not only encouraged his employes to get into the game but sent teams and motor truck to help in the evening work. His aid was most valuable. Robert Wilkins furnished a horse-roller to level the grounds. Foreman Edward Marshall of the public works department was an invaluable assistant. Edward Bicketts not only gave time and effort but the benefit of experience gained when he was one of the most active workers of the old Every Day Club playground.

But the midst of the credit goes to the men who formed the grounds committee and those who aided them night after night. The grounds were leveled and games begun; and who have been steadily on the job throughout the summer. It might seem that the work of these men was finished. Most active among them were David Ramsey, Walter Daley, Harry Scott, James Adams, Arthur Cook, Robert Nelson, Roy Henderson, Alex. Brown, Gerald Stanton and Geo. Brogan. Their example interested and enlisted the aid of many more, and today the East End Improvement League is a strong organization, with plans for a bigger and better programme next year.

This league took thought for the children at the very outset, and provided swings and teeters. The children, too, will have the benefit of the skating rink. Harry Scott, caretaker of the Boys' Club, had three or four teams of these boys playing ball all season, thus holding them together, and the Playgrounds Association stood behind his efforts. It is planned to make the skating rink the biggest in the city, with a checking room for the skaters' wraps. Robert Wilkins has promised to give the league a flag-pole and flag next spring. The league is eager to help in the development of the big Rockwood Park playground and only awaits the opportunity.

With regard to its grounds during the past season there was always the best of order. Chief Smith heartily co-operated to ensure this result. "We were just one big happy family," said one member of the grounds committee, reviewing the season's activities.

St. John was visited today by four Americans well known in circles of travel in the States—G. W. Sterling, vice-president of the Eastern Steamship Corporation, New York; W. A. 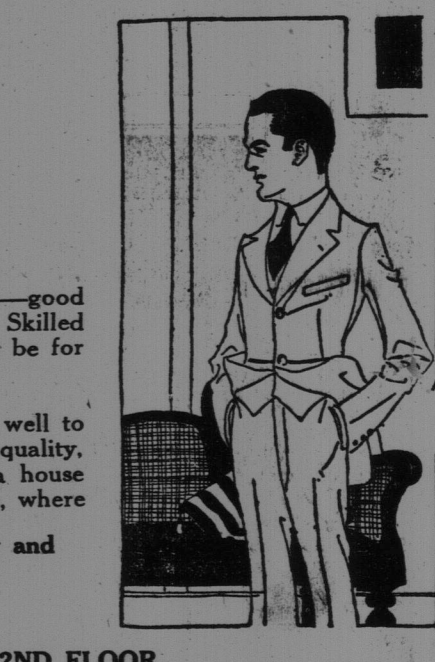
