DO'S AND DON'T'S WHILE INFLUENZA AROUND

Here are some "safety first" suggestions which, if adhered to, will tend to minimize greatly the danger of contracting Spanish influenza.

- 1—Avoid needless crowding—Spanish influenza is a crowd disease.
- 2—Smother your coughs and sneezes—others do not want the germs which you would throw away.
- 3—Your nose, get your mouth, was made to breathe through—get the habit.
- 4—Remember the three "C's"—a clean mouth, clean skin and clean clothes.
- 5—Try to keep cool when you walk and warm when you ride and sleep.
- 6—Open the windows, always, at home at night, at the office when practicable.
- 7—Food—Help by choosing and chewing your food well.
- 8—Your fork may be in your own hands—wash your hands before eating.
- 9—Don't let the waste products of digestion accumulate—drink a glass of two of water on getting up.
- 10—Don't use a napkin, towels, spoon, fork, glass or cup which has been used by another person and not washed.
- 11—Avoid tight clothes, tight shoes, tight gloves—get to make nature your ally, not your prisoner.
- 12—When the air is pure breathe all of it you can—breathe deeply.
- 13—If you think you are coming down with influenza, have your doctor make a blood count. As a rule the white cells are not increased in influenza.
- 14—When first stricken with the disorder take a very hot bath or a hot blanket pack—have a good sweat.
- 15—Use gargles and nose sprays.
- 16—A good and inexpensive throat gargle is made with one pint of boiled water, two tablespoonfuls of ordinary salt, and half a teaspoonful of permanganate of potash. A good nose spray is made of 50 grains of camphor, twenty grains of menthol, and three ounces of liquid vaseline.
- 17—Use a hand atomizer every three hours. Every person should have an individual atomizer.
- 18—Gargling the throat may sometimes help. A good gargle is made from one-half alcohol and one-half water.
- 19—Last, but not least, don't get scared. Don't live in constant fear of influenza. Keep cheerful and be optimistic. Influenza is not an imaginary disease, but a good state of mind will help you better to resist and fight it.
- 20—Do this for every case:
 - (a) Keep the feet and legs as warm as toast.
 - (b) Keep cold cloths on the head if it aches or the fever is high.
 - (c) Keep the chest wrapped up in a thick layer of cotton (front and back), covered with cheesecloth.

Five More Suggestions.
The following five suggestions were made by a Star reader who has lived in countries where plagues and epidemics occur more frequently than here:

1. DON'T expectorate in the street or other public places.
2. DON'T sweep out your house or store and throw the dust and rubbish onto the sidewalks or public streets.
3. DISINFECT all telephone mouthpieces.
4. DISINFECT the street and railroad cars and have them kept properly clean.
5. BE OUT in the fresh air as much as possible; take plenty of exercise and avoid crowds.

SALVAGE OF WASTE IN CANADIAN ARMY
SAVES \$257,509.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—The administration in England of the salvage department of the Canadian army overseas has effected saving of \$257,509 to the Canadian people during the last year. The objects of this department are the collection and conservation of all waste material, the keeping of a close check on careless waste throughout all branches of the service, the disposal of by-products by sale, and the education of all military units to appreciate the value of stores. The Canadian salvage corps has led the way in this work, and its methods have been adopted by the imperial army.

CONCLUDES SERIES OF DEMONSTRATIONS

The closing demonstration of the series given by the Housewives' League was given last evening and was given specially to the Soldiers' Wives' League. The deeply earnestness of the need of food conservation and the most scientific and economical methods of regulating diets according to patriotic and healthful principles were spoken of and ably demonstrated. Mrs. W. E. Raymond presided at the meeting and those who gave addresses were Mrs. George F. Smith, Mrs. Richard B. Hooper, Mrs. S. Alward, Miss A. Green, Mrs. Arthur Burditt, domestic science demonstrator at Litchfield (Conn.), and Mrs. J. W. V. Lawlor. Demonstrations were given by Mrs. Hooper of the cooking of rice in a fireless cooker, the making of an apple suet pudding and, by Mrs. Burditt, of a new method of cooking Hamburg steak. Both the talks and the demonstrations were eminently helpful and practical and the whole programme was a very fitting close to a splendid series. Much praise and thanks were given to Mrs. Hooper for the carrying out of the summer work of the demonstrations, in which she was ably assisted by many ready helpers, chief among them being Mrs. W. E. Raymond.

At the close of the meeting the wrapping of bread and the increased price of bread in the city were discussed and a committee was appointed to draft a petition asking for a reduction in the price of bread. The committee convenor is Mrs. C. H. Flewelling, and when completed it will have ten members. Those appointed last night were Mrs. Taylor, Mrs. J. W. V. Lawlor and Miss Alice Fairweather. The remaining personnel will be members of the vigilance committee of the Housewives' League.

Rothsday Defeats Fredericton.

The lone score was made in the first half when Short of Rothsday dropped the pigskin over the bars.
