Opera House Crowded at Both Xmas Performances—Two Fine Comedies Well Presented

If the old saying that "every heavy laugh adds a day to one's life" carries with it any significance, the hundreds who thronged the Opera House yesterday afternoon and evening will have several months attached to their allotted score, for at both the performance of Clyde Fitch's comedy "Girls," at the matinee, and of Rida Johnson Young's "The Lottery Man" in the evening, the hearty and prolonged laughter prevailed. The members of the W. S. Harkins Company made the presentations. These plays have scored a pronounced success on the American stage, and on their first production here yesterday they made a distinct triumph, so far as sheer comedies can do.

Thomas J. Carrigan, the leader, each made a favorable impression, while there were other members of the company also deserving of praise, notably, in the afternoon performance, Lydia Knott and Marie Patton. Mr. Carrigan enacted very pleasingly the role of a young lawyer, who sets his heart on Pam Gordon, a pretty man-hating stenographer, in which role Miss Baxter was seen to advantage.

"Girls" was refreshing, extremely humorous, and original, and the large holiday audience at the matinee thoroughly enjoyed it. It is to be repeated for the latter part of the week.

At the evening performance many had to be satisfied with standing room. The play was Rida Johnson Young's three act comedy "The Lottery Man," which, from the applause and laughter, it made a decided hit.

Thomas J. Carrigan as Jack Wright made a distinct hit and kept the audience laughing throughout the entire performance. His scenes with Lydia Knott, the lucky ticket holder, and with his real fiancée, were particularly well played, and the comedy role was played by Miss Marie Patton, and she kept the audience in a continuous uproar. At one time it was several minutes before the players could proceed with their lines. During the evening several handsome bouquets were presented to the ladies, and the company, this play will be presented to night and tomorrow night.

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
