Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY Person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

OVER THE WIRE

William F. Todd, M. P., for Charlotte county was tendered a reception in the Victoria Hotel, St. George on Thursday evening by friends and acquaintances.

Robert N. Venning, superintendent of fisheries for Canada who has been missing since the fisheries hearing at the Hague has been found in a hotel in Brussels where he has been for the last six weeks suffering from complete loss of memory. He is recovering.

Two engineers and a fireman are reported dead as a result of a collision between a cattle train and the Imperial Limited on the C. P. R. near Sudbury, Ont., on Saturday. All the passengers escaped without injury.

The McClellan-Smith Lumber Co.'s mill at Burton, Sunbury county, was destroyed by fire yesterday. The mill was owned by Gilbert Smith of Burton and R. W. McClellan of Fredericton and was valued at \$7,000. There was about \$4,000 insurance.

Sixty applications have been received by the civil service commission at Ottawa from prospective clerks for the Canadian Navy's recruiting station for only thirty. The larger proportion of the candidates are from the maritime provinces.

William Lawrence of Montreal, employed as a checker on the Elder-Dempster line of steamers, was drowned in Monday in the harbor on Thursday. He was a native of England and was about 48 years of age. He leaves his wife in Montreal.
