BRITAIN WILL RECEIVE HIM BUT UNOFFICIALLY

Envoys From Portugal—Dissatisfaction Against New Government is Being Spread

Lisbon, March 19—The monarchists, taking an advantage of the divisions and antagonisms among the republicans, are distributing money lavishly to spread dissatisfaction in the capital and throughout the provinces. The government's postponement of the elections for the fourth time now until May 24 has made a disagreeable impression upon the public. The announced reason for this delay in submitting to the people the choice of a president and government is that the clergy have undue influence in the Austrian army. The British foreign office has informed the Portuguese government that it will receive a representative of the republic quite unofficially and will not recognize him in a diplomatic capacity. It is on these conditions that Teixeira Gomez, the new envoy, will go to London.

WHAT MONTREAL HEARS ABOUT THOS. MALCOLM'S PLANS

Montreal, March 19—(Canadian Press)—While he refuses to discuss the matter, it is known that the projected railway line from St. John and Moncton to Quebec, through the Saguenay, is being considered by the New Brunswick railroad contractor, who is in the city on important business, is said to be in the hands of the contractor. He has purchased the Mexican charter of the Quebec & New Brunswick Railway and it is rumored that he will not only build the St. John River Valley Railway but will also carry out the larger undertaking of a line from Grand Falls, N. B., and thence down the valley to Fredericton or St. John or across to Moncton from the former place and on to Halifax.

The Federal government is already committed to the former place and on the \$2,000,000 a mile and the New Brunswick government will likely guarantee the bonds of the line from Grand Falls to St. John up to \$25,000 a mile.

SELLS PRINCES AND COUNTS

Vienna Woman in New York Seeking Rich Brides on Basis of Two Per Cent Commission

New York March 18—American brides who may be pining for ahaives with Austria's titled youth need pine no longer. The way is open to them, and the method of acquiring a prince or a count or a baron or a nobleman or a Tyrolean variety is so simple that it is within the reach of all.

There is no mystery about it. Miss Bleyer of Vienna is here to arrange it. She will smooth the path leading to an introduction to Austrian nobility. An heiress may choose from Franklin Bleyer's list of two princes and 20 counts the one she likes best. Her picture and name may strike her fancy. The rest will be easy.

Within the last few days the following advertisement has appeared in newspapers of Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Cleveland, St. Louis and Chicago.

"Wish communication with persons able to introduce high titled Austrian to American heiress. Utmost discretion, highest references. Address Bleyer, box—"

Miss Bleyer devoted a greater part of her day to reading letters and waiting out the impossible, the undesirable and the unobtainable.

A reporter found her in the house of a friend in East 88th street. She displayed no hesitancy in talking about her mission here and told of her plans.

"We in Vienna know," said she, "that in the United States there are many daughters of millionaires who have had every possible luxury showered upon them since their birth, but who long for what has always seemed to them unobtainable, namely, pride of family and social position. I can give them both.

"Do not understand that I am here representing a lot of poor young men who seek to obtain wealth without giving anything in return. Let me tell you of some of the noblemen who have placed their future happiness and that of their wives I may find them in my hands. I cannot tell you their names; that would be a serious breach of confidence, but I will tell you of their high standing.

"I have here in my list two princes, brothers, one 23 and the other 25 years of age. They are officers in the Austrian army, and their regiment is stationed at Vienna.

"Another of my clients is a Bohemian count. He is 38 years old. He has travelled extensively and is familiar with American customs.

"There is a baron, Tyrolean, nobleman, whose social rank is so high that only an archduke precedes him at social or official functions. He is 84 years old.

Miss Bleyer said her father for many years held a government position in an American city, and when she died 10 years ago, he left her mother a comfortable fortune. But it was lost through poor business management. Her father had married a daughter in Vienna. The widow received a pension of \$10,000 a year.

"If an introduction brings a marriage, Miss Bleyer must get two per cent of the bride's marriage portion. She has travelled extensively and is familiar with American customs.

"It is a perfectly straightforward and legitimate business transaction, is it not?" said she.
