Legislature of New Brunswick Is Opened at Fredericton

PLAN NEW TOWN HIGHWAY

MILITARY DISPLAY AS HOUSE OPENS

No New Features at Fredericton as Speech From Throne is Read.

HYDRO ENERGY

Many Important Matters to Come Up During the Present Session.

(By Canadian Press.)

Fredericton, Mar. 6.—The fourth session of the Eighth Legislature of New Brunswick was opened this afternoon with all the pomp and dignity as well as military display that tradition has provided, but without any features to arouse special interest other than the announcements of Government policy in the speech from the throne.

Lieutenant-Governor Todd made his first official appearance here wearing an official uniform of his rank, his appointment having so closely preceded the opening of the last session that his Honor wore plebeian attire while carrying out his official duties.

A composite Guard of Honor from local military units, under command of Major John S. Scott, presented arms while the York Regiment Band played the National Anthem as His Honor arrived at the Parliament buildings and a detachment from the Moncton Field Battery under command of Major Eaton, fired the customary salute of fifteen guns as the general entered the Legislature.

Col. Houlston, general officer commanding Military District No. 7, with a dozen other officers of high rank met the gubernatorial party upon arrival.

The speech from the throne announced that the experts report on investigations into the feasibility of development of the Grand Falls in John River was favorable and promised that the Government's decision thereon would be placed before the House at an early date and that the House would be asked to pass legislation in regard thereto. Participation by the provinces of New Brunswick in hydro development investigations at the Petcodiac River was also promised. It was stated that reconstruction of the remaining highways would be carried on "until the balance of our main arteries of traffic between the various centres of the province" was completed.
