COLD PROCESS OF COFFEE MAKING. It will strike the housewife at first reading as simply incredible that the full aroma of the coffee berry can be extracted without any application whatever of fire. The experiment will delight as well as surprise all ladies of intelligence and taste who once put this to the test. The cold process was first devised simply with a view of preventing as far as possible the escape of the aroma of the coffee berry, which is as volatile as it is delicate, and all ordinary processes more or less sacri-fice it. Take five ounces of best Mocha or old Government Java, roast and grind to a coarse powder, pour the grounds into a glass bottle or decanter; pour a suffici-ent quantity of cold water to cover the coffee, stop the bottle or decanter close, set in a warm situation for thirty hours now filter the infusion by passing it thro some fine lawn or blotting paper placed in a glass funnel, or strain through muslin. This process has been tried with hot water as well as with cold, and, while it contradicts all prevailing impressions to say so, this still remains the fact: that the cold water produces the best result. let each housekeeper try both the hot and cold water process, and decide for rself which result gratifies her most.

ROLL JELLY CAKE.—Three eggs well beaten, one cup of sugar, one and one-half cup of flour, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter (not hot), three tablespoo meter butter (not not), three tablespoonful of oream of tartar, one-half teaspoonful of soda, or one of baking powder. I bake in a long bread pan, buttered, having the batter as even as possible. Spread jelly oven. Loosen from the sides of the pan if necessary. Begin at one end and roll, slip the knife under and draw a little om the end of the pan and roll a little farther, so as it will lie on the end of the w minutes remove to a platter where it will lie straight. I roll the bottom out. as it will not crack so easily as the top, and requires less handling. Should the cake be too thick to suit you, bake next
