Q.104 Have you any evidence to give as to the character and military service of the accused?

A.104 During that period, sir, I found the accused, No. M.86303, Pte. Edward Horst Chieduch, a very satisfactory soldier, willing and a hard worker, sir.

The Prosecutor declines to cross-examine.
