The scheme was explained to the priest, y and he entered his church for fity future loans of \$1,000 each. It expects in a year or two to be retting \$60,000 advanced to his church and pay no interest on it.

In Denver, Colo., the Industrial Workers of the World are engaged in a free speech fight. The I.W.W. does not stand for political action. It is fighting with the weapons of direct action. However much we may disagree with some of their tactics, they are certainly of rebellious spir-

In Canada many wage workers look up with respect to our capital-ist courts. These courts are simply part of the machinery used by the capitalist class to protect robbery. To show how the I.W.W. members treat the courts of Colorado, the following, clipped from the Indus-trial Worker of Spokabe, is illumin-stine.

The boys in Denver have been returning to jail as soon as released, thus keeping up the fight until reinforcements arrive. Those who have fought so far are of many nationalities, and so show clearly the solidifying power of the One Big Union. The actions of the arrested men is also indicative of their spirit. The Red Flag is constantly being sung in the patrol wagon, within the walls of the jail and on the way to court. At first it was impossible to secure jury trials, but the police courts are now refusing the case. A few illustrations will show the reason:

The Eastern Townships Mutual Realty Company, with headquarters at Sherbrooke. P. Q., is another scheme locally launched with the avowed object of beating the high cost of living by cutting down your rent.

This company is incorporated under the laws of Quebec with a peculiar charter. Its purpose is to advance money for real estate upon a co-operative plan. No interest is paid or received on loans advanced. The scheme is as follows.

The members pay \$2 per month into the central fund with 30 cents administration charges added. The members are entered upon a numbered roll according to the date of their entry into the company. As soon as a thousand dollars is in the treasury, it is advanced to the member who is next on the roll. Thereafter he pays \$6 per month into the treasury, it is advanced to the member who is next on the roll.
