SHOCKING DEATH—Mr. Edward Urquhart of Roebuck, was killed on Thursday last at Fish's quarry by his clothing becoming entangled about the engine-shaft, which carried his round and dashed his head against the chime of an oil-cask, fracturing his skull. He was an honest, hardworking man and leaves a widow and two children.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN COBB—Mr. John Cobb, of Chaplin Island Road, while driving a load of sleepers towards Newcastle last Thursday afternoon, met his death by being thrown off the load, the pieces composing which were icy. No one was with him at the time of the accident, as his son and James Carroll who had helped put on the load in the woods, about three miles from Newcastle, remained behind, cutting. The body was found by Carroll and Cobb, Jr. as they were going home lying near the house with a sleeper across the unfortunate man's back.

The horses had stood for about two hours, evidently without attempting to move from the spot where the mishap took place. Deceased had, no doubt, been rendered unconscious by the fall and the blow from the sleeper as it came down upon him off the load. He was much respected in the community.

The Late Geo. A. Schofield.
The Rev. Canon Forsyth, in his Advent Sermon on "The Hastening Kingdom," in St. Mary's and St. Paul's churches on Sunday last, made the following reference to the death of Geo. A. Schofield, Esq., of St. John.

"The voices of Advent tell us of the passing day, and here and there the call of God to those who have been His servants in the church militant remind us that we must work, if we would save God well, while it is day, the night when no man can work. The church in this Diocese mourns her great loss in the death of Mr. Geo. A. Schofield, of St. John, who for many years was closely and laboriously connected with her work as a member of her Synods, Diocesan and Provincial, and as the able secretary of her Board of Home Missions. At the present time his loss seems to be irreparable, as his long experience, accurate knowledge, wise counsel, great business ability and self-sacrificing devotion, preclude the expectation that his work can be immediately and fully taken up by any one who remains. Nevertheless, God in His own time and way raise up those who step into the shoes of those who have gone before. The ranks of His faithful soldiers and servants. And well may it be the ambition of young laymen in the church and Kingdom of God to become fitted to take the position Mr. Schofield occupied in her councils and in her work of her mission work, and in the illustration of her religious and devotional life. For his was the example of a layman who although burdened with secular duties the burden of which is calculated to overtax the strongest, yet never allowed this to interfere with the claims of the church's work or with his religious habits, but was ever ready and anxious to find time for work for the church of God, and was always in his place at her services until God called him while on his way from his last attendance at public worship. Such are the men who have God's Kingdom in her councils of the world, for Jesus Christ. The army of the Living God is sensible of a shock as the soldier falls who is among the foremost followers of the conquering King. But inspired by worthy example it is for those who fill up the ranks who were the loyal and true have fallen in the service of God and men, to emulate their conduct and endeavor to hasten the time when in the last and eternal triumph of Christ and His Kingdom over sin and evil will be rewarded according to his work."

Slipshod Management.
Whoever is responsible for the management of Town matters ought to be made aware of the fact that the fire bell ring and the Electric Station whistle blown according to the printed directions in regard to fire alarms. When the alarm given on Wednesday evening of last week for the little fire at the residence of Mr. W. C. Winslow, it did not indicate which of the wards it was in, until after the bell had been ringing for some time. This is an annoyance to be remedied. There is an attempt to make it ring in two or three times, but there was hardly any appreciable pause after the two strokes indicating the locality of the fire until the next two were made. It is less than a minute, then, to return to the excited and inadequate style of ringing.

When the Electric station whistle was blown there was the same want of attention to the rule for fire alarms.

There is no excuse for such evident lack of order or discipline. It indicates a slovenliness and absence of proper instruction in the fire service and ought to be remedied. Surely there is some man at the council board capable of seeing that a reform shall be effected in this and some other matters which are allowed to drift, as they will. It is a piece with the neglect of snow plowing on the streets after the storm of last week and of inattention to several minor town interests which are neglected, to say nothing of the neglect of the fire alarm.

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
