CITY LABORERS AND ALDERMEN.

The laborers are very indignant at the statements made by Ald. Christie before the common council Monday.

Ald. Christie and laborers who had seen him insisted that the old men should get \$1.56 per day. These old men did not earn \$1 a day, nor even-50 cents. Numbers of the men were worth \$1.50, but he did not think it proper to pay the old men any such money. These men were worth about \$1.58, but no more. Many of the old men entered on the city work after having become old in the employ of others. Director Cushing was willing to give the \$1 men what they were worth, say \$1.25, and the \$1.25 men \$1.50 where they were found to be worth such money. This was the first time the council had had a chance to consider this question. He disputed the right of the men to ask for the increases to begin on June 1st.

The laborers say that they did not ask for \$1.50 per day for the old men, and this Director Cushing is acting in direct opposition to the wishes of the council, as he only offered to give a few of the men an increase of ten cents a day, making the maximum wage \$1.30 per day.

The committee from the laborers' union waited on Mr. Cushing again yesterday morning. They failed to get any satisfaction from the director, and found him still obdurate in his refusal to grant them the increase.

At the meeting of the union last evening the vigilance committee reported that one laborer, an Assyrian, had returned to work on Germain street. The laborers in discussing this, passed the following minute: We would ask our fellow citizens if we are to be brought down to the level of such people? We can't live as they live. Do our fellow citizens want us to?
