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REPORT OF CHANGE IN CUSTOMS REGULATIONS

Whereby Theatrical Scenery is Admitted Under Bond—No Word Here of of the New Plan

A despatch from New York says:—The National Association of Theatrical Producing Managers, received from A. J. Small, the Canadian theatrical manager, official notification of the action of the Canadian Government in removing the duties on scenery charged on theatrical scenery used by companies in tours of the Dominion.

The question of Canadian duties has been particularly aggravating, as many American companies find it necessary to cross the boundary two or three times in a single tour, and have, therefore, had to pay a duty each time.

Speaking to the Star today Collector Dunn said he had received no word of any such change in the customs regulations and as far as this port of entry is concerned duty will continue to be charged as usual.

On the arrival of scenery, etc., belonging to any theatrical company one of the appraisers puts a value on the stuff. Advertising matter pays on a fair value, but scenery adds such second-hand goods are rated rather low.

The New York despatch goes on to say: When the National Association of Theatrical Producing Managers recently voted that after May 1, 1908, no companies should be sent into Canada unless certain improvements in the copyright laws and the consequent protection against piracy were put into effect specific mention was also made of the inclusion of the customs exemptions.

The action with regard to duties was obtained through the intervention of the Canadian Theatre Managers' Association, of which Mr. Small is president. In sending notice of the resolution to the National Association, Mr. Small assured the National Association of the co-operation of the Canadian managers in the copyright matters on which the actual enforcement of the law is being effected.

It is also expected that a movement will soon be put on foot to reduce or abolish the present high duties on theatrical scenery printed by touring companies.

He claimed to have been at spectacle's pool room until midnight, then spent some time in a chowder eatery, and when found by Policeman Lucas said he was down in that lonely section of the city to see if any of his chums were around, as they had been out fishing, and he wanted to see what luck they had before he went to his home on Exmouth street.

The magistrate said it was a cook and a bull story, and imposed the fine.

Policeman Lucas also informed the court that McNeil had reached out of the cell door in Brussels street lock-up and destroyed a sweater belonging to the officer.

POLICE SPEEDILY ARREST MAN WHO STOLE HORSE
