ROOSEVELT, IN PERIL, KILLS 2 HIPPOPOTAMI

NATASHA, British East Africa, July 25.—Colonel Roosevelt had an exciting experience yesterday while endeavoring to kill a cow hippopotamus. He was on Lake Natasha in a row boat, accompanied by two natives, when the boat was surrounded by a dozen hippopotami, who attacked the boat, some of them diving under and striking the bottom of it with their backs. The natives became terrified, but Colonel Roosevelt was not dismayed, and selecting the finest bull and the largest cow, shot them dead. The rest of the animals were driven off.

Kermit Roosevelt has arrived at Natasha, but the rest of the expedition will not reach here until tomorrow.

EL GALO CAPTURES THE 2.15 CLASS AND PRIZE

ONE OFFER STAKES

The midsummer meet at Moosepath closed yesterday with El Galo of the Pine Tree Stables, Lewiston, Maine, the winner of 2.15 class, and Prince Louise the winner of the 2.24. The weather was warm, but a stiff breeze blew across the track and under the circumstances very good time was made. The attendance was better than had been expected.

El Galo captured the 2.15 in straight heats and had little difficulty in so doing. Miss Letha, who won second money, was second in the first and third heats, being beaten out in the second heat by Laura Merrill. The Dunsmuir mare was rather disappointing to her backers, getting only third money. Kingsborough was also disappointing for all but the first two heats and was drawn from the race.

Kingsborough had the pole in the first heat of the 2.15, but was slow in starting, with the result that it was not until after repeated scoring that the horses got away. The Digby horse led the front, with Miss Letha right behind and El Galo third. The grey mare from Fredericton, however, was cheered by the crowd. El Galo, who was going fast and on the third quarter pulled up to the lead, holding it to the finish. The time was pretty good considering that a heavy wind was blowing. By quarters it was: 31.107 1-2, 1.43, 2.19 3-4.

In the second heat Kingsborough on the first lap gave promise of finishing well, but soon bent back to last position. Miss Letha led till the third quarter, with El Galo second. The Maine horse opened out as he had done in the first. Laura Merrill followed him to the wire, with Kingsborough a second. Time by quarters: 34.109 1-4, 1.54, 2.18.

The third and last heat of the 2.15 class was marked by Laura Merrill's mad behavior immediately after the start. The Maine horse was in the lead after passing the judges' stand and was not into his stride for some time. He was, however, not touched by a hat which was blown onto the track in front of the stand as the horses were closing. Laura Merrill led her last lap and El Galo on the first lap and following closely. In the second with the Lewiston gelding leading, with Frank Fox's X-Ray and Miss Letha following closely. In the second half El Galo increased his lead, winning handsily. Time by quarters: 34.107, 1.43, 2.18.

In the 2.24 trot for the Dufferin Hotel at 2100, interest was keen, as close racing between Crescent and Prince Louise was expected. Crescent was the favorite, but was beaten in straight heats by the St. Stephen gelding after capturing the first heat. Crescent got the second heat, but was again beaten to Frank Fox's Genevieve, which got two thirds and a second. Boutiller's time: 2.24.

Frank Power could get nothing better than fourth place in the first three heats, but in the fourth pulled up to third. Merit P. of the Valley Stables, Sussex, and King Arden, owned by Alex. H. C. Jewett of Fredericton, were not in it at any stage.

Fox's Genevieve, the pole horse, took the lead in the first heat and held it until the half mile had been covered, when the Yankee mare's bad break let Prince Louise go ahead. Genevieve pulled up, however, and regained her lead. She held it until the horses rounded into the home stretch, when Crescent and Prince Louise came up on the outside and beat her to the wire, Crescent taking the heat. The finish made the crowd sit up. Time, 2.25 2-3.

In the second heat Prince Louise took the lead from Crescent in the first quarter and held it until the finish. The excitement was furnished by the brushes between Genevieve and Crescent, which were repeated in the second place in the heat. Time, 2.24 1-4. Prince Louise captured the third heat after breaking on both laps. He finished the half mile in first position, with Genevieve second, and Crescent third. After that Country Jay had the finishing powers of the lot and won more easily. Time, 2.26 2-3.

Terre Haute was a strong favorite and she showed the way in the opening laps until Country Jay rushed up to her in the stretch. The mare surprised her too, went to a break, and led the race. Time, 2.26 2-3.

Next in a driving finish, Judge Lee beat Country Jay about six inches. The mare until Country Jay had the finishing powers of the lot and won more easily. Time, 2.26 2-3.
