Romantic History Attaches to Arichat

North Sidney, N. S., May 25; (Special to "The Madawaska") - Arichat, the county seat of Richmond County Nova Scotia, is located on Isle Madame, a small island separated from Cape Breton by Lennox Passage. The population is about 1,500 mostly fishermen or farmers of French descent, along with the descendants of the Acadians, some of whom made their way there after the expulsion from Grand Pre in 1755. One of the oldest settlements in Nova Scotia, records now in the Archives at Ottawa and in the Customs House at Arichat, prove the importance of this port as a shipping and fishing centre as far back as 1800. Arichat, when Louisburg was the Dunkirk of America, was strongly fortified, being the southern outpost of the island, after the final capture of Louisburg in 1758, it was reduced by the British from its standing as a garrison town. The seat of the present diocese of Antigonish, was originally Arichat. Here also St. Francis Xavier University was founded in 1853, being transferred in 1855 to Antigonish. A visit to Arichat brings one to an almost different land. Here the rush and bustle so prevalent in the outside world are lacking. Having one of the best harbors in Cape Breton and being the home of some of the best seamen in the country, this port was at one time a great shipping centre. Square riggers, brigantines and barkentines were built and launched here, plying their trade all over the seven seas. The farms are laid out on the French system, so often seen in villages in Quebec. In the front the houses are close together, and the farms spread out in the back, and everything spotlessly clean, white being the predominating colour. Arichat, from its geographical location, its age and history, has been an exhaustless source of material for novelists and other writers for years.

INCREASE OF MEMBERSHIP IN THE PROVINCE

Edmundston, N. B. May 23rd 1931. - Delegates of the New Brunswick Councils of the Knights of Columbus met at Edmundston, to-day, for their annual State Convention, with State Deputy E. J. White in the chair. Convention opened with a high mass celebrated in the Immaculate Conception Church by Rev. Father Lochary, pastor of West Saint John Catholic church and State Chaplain of the Order. Deliberations took place in the Council room of the Edmundston Council where State officers, past State Deputies, district deputies and delegates met in two sessions. His Worship Mayor Michaud welcomed the delegates in our Town, stating that he did not have to present the keys of the Town as there was no gale. Visitors can enter freely in our Town and enjoy at all times the good hospitality of its population. Reports of the different activities were read and received by the convention. The State Deputy White presented a well prepared report reviewing the activities of the Order in New Brunswick during the last year. His report showed an increase in membership of over 100. Dr. Broderick of Saint John, chairman of the Scholarship Committee announced that twelve students were maintained at college with the generous cooperation of every member in this province. M. U. Canadian Forests Yield \$500,000,000

Ottawa, Canada, May 24; (Special to "The Madawaska") - The value of forest products in Canada is placed at approximately \$500,000,000 by the Canadian Government Forestry service, and over 200,000 persons are employed in the extraction and manufacture of the products of the forests of the Dominion. Canadian lumber, wood pulp, pulpwood and peepare exported to the United States, the British Isles, Australia, South Africa, New England, Japan, China and other countries. Last year the value of these exports was over \$291,000,000. There are about 3,000 saw mills and 108 pulp and paper mills in Canada. The saw mills represent a capital investment of \$600,000,000. The former employ about 45,000 persons and the latter about 34,000.

Guarantee Purity Of Maple Products

Ottawa, May 26; (Special to "The Madawaska") - Producers of Canadian maple syrup and maple sugar are required to label their product to indicate the true contents of the container. The law, passed by the Dominion parliament, stipulates that the word "maple" may not be used on the package except in the case of the pure and unadulterated product, and that no other words or phrases, pictures or trademarks, not even the traditional picture of the log cabin of a kind that suggests maple products, will be allowed on containers other than those holding the pure maple syrup or maple sugar. Canada's output of maple sugar and maple syrup annually is valued at more than \$6,000,000 by the Dominion Department of Agriculture and about one-fifth of the output is sold to the United States.

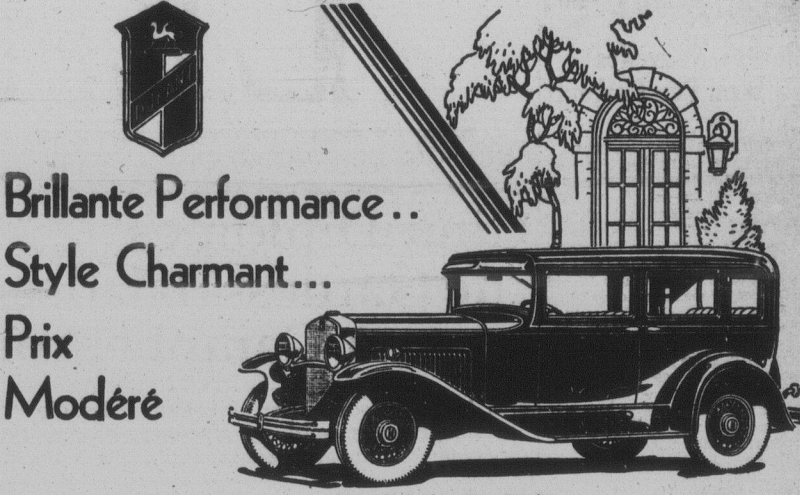

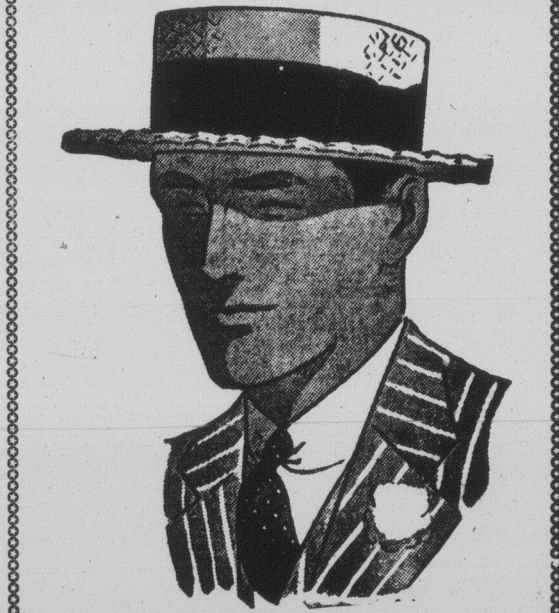
