THE ALLAN LINE.

The Allan liner *Virginia* was 442 miles west of Malin Head at 1 p. m. Monday and is due in Liverpool this morning.

The Allan liner *Victoria* was 150 miles east of Belleisle at 6 a. m. Monday. She is due at Quebec this afternoon, and at Montreal tomorrow.

LOADS LUMBER.

The Norwegian barque *Alexander Lawrence* arrived at Halifax from Rio Janeiro on her way to a New Brunswick port, to load lumber.

LOST A JIB.

The tern schooner *Annie F. Conlon*, bound from a Nova Scotian port to Philadelphia, was sighted off Nauset on Sunday morning with her flying jib blown to pieces.

LOST ONE OF CREW.

The fishing schooner *Onato* had her flag at half-mast on arriving in Boston, telling of the loss of Horace Nickerson, one of the crew, who was drowned Friday, off Teachers' Island, when the schooner crashed into one of the fishing dories. Nickerson was 30 years old and lived with his father in Nova Scotia.

HOPES GIVEN UP.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—All hopes for the safety of the Dominion Coal Company's collier *Bridgeport*, which is now ten days overdue, have been practically given up by shipping men of Montreal, who are of the opinion that the vessel was so heavily loaded she has split in half and foundered with all on board, eight officers and a Chinese crew of thirty-three.

One Chinaman in Montreal, Hum Lung, was to have sailed on board the vessel, but was imprisoned for deserting his ship.

TWENTY VESSELS ARE OVERDUE

Reports from Abroad Show Bad Storm and Numerous Vessels are Overdue.

STEEL FREIGHTER OVERDUE

Fort William, Ont., Nov. 11.—Immediately on receipt of the advice of Captain Poots of the S. S. *Hamonic* that he had sighted what he took to be the steel freighter *Leadford*, the rocks at Angus Island, the steam tug J. T. Horn was dispatched to the scene of the disaster. The tug arrived back in port late last night with the information that no vessel was around on the island, other than the old hull of the *Monkhead*, which was wrecked some years ago. The supposition is that Captain Poots had either mistaken the wrecked hull for the *Leadford*, or if a vessel had been wrecked there she had all of it into deep water and sunk. The *Leadford* was loaded with steel rails for the Canadian Pacific Railway. She is several days overdue.

NINETEEN OVERDUE

Fort William, Ont., Nov. 11.—The following vessels are overdue at this port, some of them several days:

McKee, Athabasca, and Alberta. The last mentioned steamer is reported at White Fish Point. Local mariners say the storm was the worst for many years on Superior.

SIX LIVES LOST

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 11.—Lighthouse No. 3, carrying a crew of six persons stationed in Lake Erie, off Point Abino, fifteen miles west of this city, is reported lost by incoming vessels, and is believed to have foundered, during the recent storm. Wreckage of the lighthouse floated into Buffalo harbor this morning and was picked up on the beach at the foot of Michigan street. The steamer consisted of a boat ralling and two or three doors, apparently of a boat, and several life-preservers marked "United States L. V. 82." The ship carried a crew of six men, as follows: Hugh M. Williams, captain, Manisto, Michigan; Cornelius, Leahy, assistant engineer, Eliria, Ohio; A. Leahy, mate, William Jensen, seaman, Muskegon, Mich.; Peter Mackey, cook, Buffalo; Charles Butler, engineer, residence unknown.

The lighthouse was gone when we passed her anchorage this morning at 5:20 o'clock," said Captain F. A. Dupuis, master of the ore carrier *Champlain*, after seeing the steamer this morning. "There was no sign of the lighthouse and we decided that the boat either had gone to bottom or had run down to this city. The fact that the lighthouse is not in port strengthens our fear early this morning that she was driven from her anchorage in the gale and went to the bottom."

The *Champlain* is one of four freighters which passed Point Abino early this morning. Residents of Point Abino, six miles from the lighthouse station, reported the ship not in sight.

Mr. Horace House, lighthouse inspector, left aboard the lighthouse tender *Crocus* for the light vessel's station as soon as the disappearance was reported to him. The vessel was a 30 foot steel craft 150 feet long with a 30 foot beam.

A WOMAN OF MYSTERY

Some History Discovered After Sixty Years of Obscurity.

In a modest little house on the outskirts of historic old Jamestown, Va., there died recently a very aged but remarkable woman. She had lived in this house since the oldest resident could remember and for over sixty-six years she had received every month a 10-pound draft on the Bank of England. Her life was spent in her work, all of her designs and patterns going abroad, most of them to the great mills of England, Scotland and Switzerland.

She was evidently an artist of great ability, for among her effects were found some exceedingly rare sketches and paintings.

A recent letter bearing the signature of Jane Arden MacFarland, revealed the fact that this mysterious little woman was the grandmother of Jane Arden, "the artist," and creator of the "Imperial Patterns," who was plain, after being recently presented to the Queen of England and was married to the only son of Sir Edward MacFarland, the 11th Earl of Cromartie.

The "Imperial Patterns" were the masterpiece of Jane Arden and were so named by Queen Mary who adopted them for her court costumes and pronounced them the most beautiful designs ever created.
