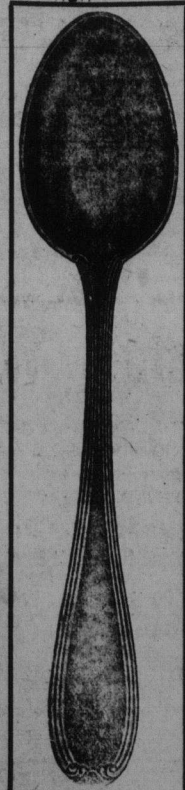

MOUNT ALLISON IN  
CENTENARY CHURCH

Rev. Dr. Line Asks for Financial Assistance for Sackville Institutions.

At a meeting of the Board of Regents of Mount Allison University, held November 1, it was resolved to make a special appeal to the churches of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland to increase their contributions to the educational fund.

Last evening Rev. John Line, D.D., of Mount Allison University, made an eloquent appeal to the congregation of Centenary Methodist church for funds to help carry on the work at the school. He took for his text Ecclesiastes 9:10: "I returned, and saw under the sun, that the race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, neither yet bread to the wise, nor yet riches to men of understanding, nor yet favor to men of skill, but time and chance happeneth to them all."

He said there were two methods of investigating the facts of life, the method of working out facts of life by mental processes and by theorizing, called the rationalistic method, and the method of working out the facts of life by going out into the world, classifying and correlating the conditions met with, called the empiricist method.

The time has come when it is no longer necessary for people to live in solitude thinking and reflecting on life. People are now required, to go out into the world and gain experience so that they can better understand and help mankind. We ought to see to it that we do not become too much men of the world.

Men who have made church history began their active career in later life, living a life of seclusion before. They did not rush into active life, they prepared themselves beforehand and consecrated themselves beforehand and consecrated themselves beforehand and consecrated themselves beforehand.

The institution's great function is to keep alive the principles of eternity in the lives of young people and also the work of the colleges should be practicable.

"We are sending men out of Mount Allison," he said, "who are reflective and at the same time men of the world who can cope with the world's problems. Those who know our school are proud of what her students are doing on the battlefields of Europe."

Mr. Line gave out the following after his sermon: The campaign for funds that was carried on in the year ending May, 1916, resulted in an increase of \$1,398.16 over the amount obtained the year before. This amount has proved a very gratifying contribution towards reducing the year's deficit, so that notwithstanding the loss of sixty per cent. of the students and a decrease in income of \$4,500, they were able to close the year with a net deficit of only \$4,332.95. The outlook for the coming year is less reassuring than last, owing to the fact that the attendance is still small.

The feeling obtains strongly in the board that the educational interests of the church should rank in importance with the great missionary claims that lie so close to the heart of the people. It is true that the men sent to the mission field mean more to the cause than the mere money that sends them, it is a matter of vital importance to the work of the church, both at home and abroad, that the institutions where men get their training should be kept strong and efficient.

The conviction is growing that the moulding of lives of young men and young women in the atmosphere of a Christian college is of transcendent importance to both the church and the state. Among the many fine colleges of which Canadian Methodism has reason to be proud, Mount Allison institutions have always stood in the front and for over fifty years have been sending forth an influence which has enriched the public life of our land. It is the glory of these schools that in a time of national crisis over 300 graduates and students have gone forth to uphold the honor of the Empire.

The Rev. Mr. Line preached in the morning at the Queen Square Methodist church.

## THE POLICE COURT.

In the police court Saturday William Harriett was remanded on the charge of having liquor for sale without a license.

Six drunks were fined eight dollars each.

In the juvenile court three small boys were given some sound advice and then allowed to go. They were charged with opening the chute in a sand bin owned by the Street Railway Company. The father of one of the boys was fined \$22 on account of his son not attending school for seven days.

Two boys were charged with stealing. Their parents were summoned to appear in court and the matter stands for the present.

THRILLING ACCIDENT  
ON GLEN FALLS LINE

Car Leaves Rails and Runs to Bank of Creek—Motorman Injured, but Passengers Escape.

Motorman Moore of the street railway service was severely injured on the Glen Falls line Saturday night, and that the accident did not prove more serious is miraculous. It was about nine o'clock and the passengers in the car at the time were Walter Pedersen, the florist, Mrs. Coates and three children. The car was going at a fair rate of speed when one of the brake beams became detached from the truck and fell to the roadbed. This caused the brakehandle to fly round and in doing so it struck Motorman Moore in the stomach and threw him through the car door to the side of the track.

The car then jumped the rails and before it came to a stop it was within about four feet from the edge of the bank of a creek. County Police-man Saunders assisted in conveying the injured motorman to the Glen View Hotel which was near the scene of the accident.

Hazen McLean, the street railway inspector, was notified, and on his arrival at the Glen View had the injured motorman conveyed home in a coach. He was attended by a doctor, and although very sore from the blow he received nothing serious is indicated.

The place where the car left the rails is almost in the rear of the Ford automobile factory, and had the car run into the creek, it is most probable that the passengers would have been badly injured.

## Inland Revenue Receipts.

Receipts during November on account of Inland Revenue here show an increase of \$13,181.84 over those for November last year, the figures being as follows: 1916, spirits, \$27,775.13; raw leaf, \$142.62; cigars, \$525; bonded manufacturers, \$139.18; other receipts, \$4,768.98; total, \$33,350.81. 1915, spirits, \$15,469.72; raw leaf, \$138.60; cigars, \$760; bonded manufacturers, \$33.41; other receipts, \$3,477.63; total, \$20,169.37.

## Deaths Last Week.

During the past week twenty-two deaths were reported to the Board of Health, the causes being as follows: Pneumonia, four; senility, three; influenza, three; diabetes, bronchitis, typhoid fever, heart failure, gastro-enteritis, arterio sclerosis, angina pectoris, cardiac asthma, acute nephritis, cerebral effusion, cancer of neck and hemorrhage of brain, one each.

John E. Bryam, of Watch and Worn Society, was Last Seen in This City Bound for Sydney.

According to Rev. J. Frank Chase, secretary of the Watch and Worn Society of Massachusetts, he believes that one of his detectives, John M. Bryam, had been spirited away. Bryam has been traced to Bangor and St. John in which cities he wrote post cards to relatives in Somerville, Mass., stating that he intended to go to Sydney. Mr. Chase telegraphed to Sydney but the missing man could not be located.

Bryam was employed to bring a case against Thomas H. Keane, proprietor of the Mansion House at New Bedford for maintaining a liquor nuisance.

The hotel was raided and the case is now being tried in the superior court at Taunton. When Secretary Chase went to get Bryam to testify it was found he had left the state. The secretary states that he gave a suitcase containing some Mansion House liquor to an agent named Parker. While walking along the street in New Bedford, Parker was assaulted by someone who attempted to get the liquor. Parker fired a shot but no one was hurt.

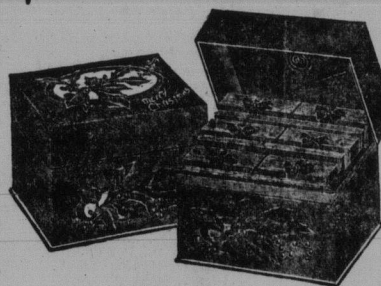

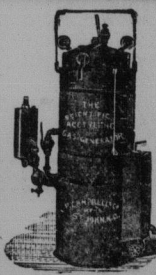

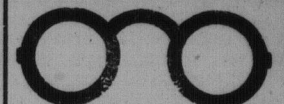
