

FRENCH DETERMINED TO TRACK GERMAN

THE FRENCH ON WAY TO ST. QUENTIN CITY

Advancing Army of France Encounters Grim Tragedies—French Pursuit Speedy and Enemy Frequently Forced to Leave Before Completing Work of Destruction.

New York, March 27.—A news agency dispatch published here today follows: With the French armies advancing from Soissons, March 27.—French soldiers do not pull down the carcasses of rabbits, crows, hawks, squirrels and the like which they find occasionally strung on wires dangling from ruins of houses destroyed by the Germans in their retreat.

Deliberate Wantonness.

If anything was needed to arouse the French forces to utter fury it was this deliberate wantonness, not excusable on the ground of military necessity. Certainly the concrete shelters were of vastly more military value than the fruit trees. The German desire to annihilate the French was not, as far as I know, in any of the monuments of antiquity.

CHRISTIAN SCIENTISTS HONOR MARY BAKER EDDY

Boston, March 27.—The magnificent memorial to Mary Baker Eddy, which has been built in Mt. Auburn Cemetery, Cambridge, at a cost of more than \$150,000, contributed by the Christian Scientists throughout the world has been turned over to the Christian Science board of directors by Albert S. Barlow of New York, who has been in charge of its construction, a work that has consumed a year and a half.

The site of the beautiful memorial is one of great natural beauty, and its steep grade has rendered possible a more picturesque treatment from an architectural standpoint than would be possible on a level lot. The land on which the memorial stands is about 80 feet square, and slopes gradually from the level of the roadway to the lake, with a drop of about 10 feet.

The memorial itself is composed of white Bethel granite in the form of an open circular colonnade of eight columns, 15 feet high, built upon a stylobate of three steps. The extreme width of the memorial is about 50 feet, while the colonnade is 18 feet in diameter. The inscription in the frieze and on the top of the pylons is done in white bronze on a deep blue stone work. The detail is wholly floral in form and free in treatment, the wild rose and the morning-glory being the chief motives.

Egerton Swartout of New York, architect of the memorial, who has also designed the new George Washington Memorial, the new Missouri State Capitol and the new Federal Building in Denver is particularly pleased with the site of the Eddy memorial.

"The design for this memorial," he stated recently, "was a spontaneous product. It was a gradual development from the original scheme and was influenced by the character of the memorial, by the site, and by the material that was finally adopted. It was essential that the memorial be simple and dignified in character; not overornamented, and yet worthy of its high purpose; strong, and yet, expressing in its detail feminine rather than masculine strength; and above all, it should not be in any sense a copy of any existing structure."

The site is singularly pleasing; in fact, I question whether a finer site could anywhere be found. It can be seen from all sides equally well, close at hand from the cemetery road, and from a quarter of a mile away across the lake. Indeed, it is this body of water which forms the chief beauty of the site.

"I think it can be said without fear of contradiction that, leaving aside entirely any artistic excellence, such perfection and delicacy have never been attained before in the carving of granite. There is certainly nothing in modern times that can approach it, not, as far as I know, in any of the monuments of antiquity.

CANADIAN CADETS CAN ENTER NAVY

Ottawa, March 27.—The Naval Service Department announces that final arrangements have been made for the special entry of Canadian cadets to the Imperial Navy. The regulations provide that candidates must be between seventeen and a half years of age on the first of June next. After physical and other necessary examinations the names of suitable candidates will be sent to the admiralty. Final examinations will take place in England.
