

Destroying Weed Seed.

There are many ways in which weed seeds may be destroyed on the farm, says G. H. Clark, chief of the seed division, Ottawa. Quantities of weed seeds get out into the farmyard at threshing time. There is a general tendency just at that time to do things with a rush. The threshing machine is apt to be overcrowded and many of the weed seeds, as well as a considerable quantity of grain, carried out with the straw. These are likely to germinate and grow with the next crop. A little care in the barn at the time of threshing and cleaning of grain, especially seed grain, will do much to lessen turne labor with hee and cultivator. Cleaning from grain containing weed seeds should be boiled or very finely ground. 
