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AMMUNITION CART FOR PULPIT
 Soldiers and Civilians Attend An Unique Service at Camp Sussex

Sussex, N. B., July 1.—(Special)—His pulpit, a flag draped ammunition cart with a drum upon which to lay the scriptures, Rev. Canon Montgomery, camp chaplain, conducted divine service in front of the staff lines this morning.

Beyond the rows of burmished and polished, brushed and pipe-charged troops, were hundreds of civilians on foot and in teams, and the service, which occupied less than an hour, was watched with great interest. The force, as drawn up, formed three sides of a square with the commandant and staff standing in advance of the infantry brigade.

With hand the Roman Catholic troops paraded north the rebuffs and under command of Chief Baker, of Newcastle, marched to the town chapel. About 200 representing practically all of the different regiments of the army were present.

Throughout today all roads led to Camp and elsewhere. The cannons were pointed by delicate hands, and many a copy face looked in at the cook house door. Hand concerts were given and down in the army, the presence of a teacher in the found additional entertainment in tossing a comrade in a blanket.

With the exception of a slight disturbance in the night, the camp was in a peaceful mood since the opening of camp. An infantry man, it is alleged, when near the station, accepted a woman and when the police, formerly a teacher in the service corps attempted to interfere, in the prisoner's behalf.
