Matter of New Science Building Discussed and Generous Donations Made Towards It.

Sackville, N. B., May 29-The board

Saciville, N. B., May 29—The board of regents of Mount Allison institutions were in session all day yesterday and until a late hour last evening. Dr. Jost, chairman of the board, was in the chair and various matters in connection with the government of the institutions were dealt with. The reports from the heads of the institutions of the past year's work were very satisfactory indeed. The total registration for the three institutions for the year was \$26.

A resolution was passed authorizing the executive to secure the services of a field secretary to be engaged immediately in the interests of the institutions. The matter of the construction of a new science building was considered at length and the prospects seem bright for the erection of such a building before very long. J. R. Dinnis, of Charlottetown, offered to give \$10,000 towards the erection of a science building, provided \$60,000 were raised. In addition to this subscription Governor Wood, R. C. Tait, Shediac, and Dr. Heartz, Amherst, agreed to give \$1,000 each, while E. R. Machum, of St. John, offered \$500. These subscriptions are in addition to those already received towards the endowment fund. J. R. Dinnis subscribed \$10,000 towards the endowment fund and with his latest gift will make a total of \$20,000 subscribed towards the institutions, James D.
