The contest yesterday was well fought out. From the moment the polls opened the friends of the candidates worked with an energy and determination never before witnessed in St. John. In every Ward in the City the ground was contested manfully, nothing being left undone on either side. Up to eleven DeVeber men having made their grand climax best illustrated in the quaint o'clock the vote stood about even, the charge at an early hour and with such vigor as to astonish Mr. Tilley's friends.
