Overweight Is to Be Desired By Persons Under 30, Says Expert

Washington, D.C.-Up to the age of 30, overweight is likely to add years to life, but after that it has the opposite tendency.

That is one of the conclusions reached by specialists of the Nutrition Laboratory of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, after many years devoted to the study of metabolism, the fundamental vital process involving the combustion of food materials when united with oxygen in the cells.

"During youth and the period of rapid growth," it was said, "statistics show clearly that overweight is a distinct asset towards longevity.
