The East Huron fair held here Thursday and Friday, Oct. 1 and 2, far exceeded any former fair in point of attendance, receipts, etc. The vegetable show was in abundance and of good quality. Cattle, horses, sheep, pigs and poultry were never during the history of this fair so well up in quality, breed and condition. The inside show was much better than in former years. The attendance was 3,000. Weather fine and warm.

The stage driver who carries the mail north to Wroxeter from Brussels, also carries the Dominion express. He reports that on Tuesday night, Sept. 29, he was set upon by two robbers on the highway a few miles south of Wroxeter. Stratford.

Wm. Forster, of the Beacon job rooms, has gone to try his fortune in the west. He is a first-class job hand and is bound to succeed wherever he goes.

The North Perth fair held Thursday and Friday, Oct. 1 and 2, was the most successful exhibition ever held in this city. The weather was fine, the attendance exceptionally large, and the exhibits were more extensive and of a better class than those shown in former years. During the past few months the society expended about \$2,300 in improving the grounds and buildings. A covered grand stand capable of seating 1,000 persons was erected, as well as a new poultry house and sheds for horses and other stock. One of the principal events Friday was a tug-of-war for a purse of \$100 between the famous Zorra team, captained by E. L. Sutherland, and a Stratford team under the command of Jas. Dunsmore. Although heavier than their opponents the local men were no match for the champions, who scored an easy victory. The exhibit of horses was said by prominent horsemen to be one of the best ever made in Western Ontario. The increased interest taken by farmers in stock-raising and the result of careful breeding were also well shown in the display of cattle, nearly all the animals exhibited being of an exceptionally high class. Within the main building the usual display of vegetables, flowers, and manufactured articles of various kinds could be seen. The piano and organ men were out in full force, so that the air was constantly filled with music. S. R. Hesson, ex-M. P., exhibited some very fine cut flowers, to the growing of which he has devoted considerable attention of late years. A life-size oil painting portrait of his Worship Mayor Brown from the studio of P. Dierlamm was also a centre of attraction. The show in general was a decided success, and reflected creditably upon the Committee of Management, to whose energy and untiring exertions much of its success was due.


