M.P., president of the club, devoted the greater part of his speech to an explanation of why anti-election promises by him had not been kept by him. Le Temps says that Mr. Belcourt stated that a number of Conservatives will be dismissed from the buildings to make room for those Liberals to whom he had made promises during the general election campaign. Mr. Pierre Rattey, door-keeper of the Senate, also addressed the meeting, and is reported as expressing the hope that all the Deputy Ministers would be discharged in order to make room for good Liberals."

And inquired whether the attention of the Government has, in the past, been called to them, and, if so, whether such conduct is considered by them as offensive partisanship?

If so, what course do they intend to take in the matter?

If the utterances of Mr. Rattey have not been brought under the notice of the Government in the past, what course do the Government intend to take now that the offensive partisanship of Mr. Rattey, an officer of this House, has been brought under their notice?
