Ottawa, 24th March, 1914.

Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 28th nitimo as to deceased Indians on the Jaughnawaga Reserve for burial without a medical certificate, I beg to inform you that on communicating with the Deputy Attorney Seneral for the Province of Quebes he refers to Article 4428 R.S.Q. 1909, which states: "That no interment shall be "proceeded with before the efficer appointed for the "registration of acts of civil status has been tended "a certificate establishing the cause of Seath, or a "transport permit exchanged for such a certificate." The Deputy Attorney Seneral states that in the absence of Dominion legislation he considers that this provision applies to Indian reserves and that the difficulty on the Caughnawaga reserve can be met by your enforcing the Provincial law.

I have therefore to request that you will endeavour as far as possible to have the Provincial law in this regard carried out.
