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FIRST WITNESS FOR THE PROSECUTION (continued)

- Q. What time do you eat?
- A. 1700 hrs.
- Q. It is usual for the dvr to go without his evening meal?
- A. He could usually eat at the offrs' mess.
- Q. Was it usual for the dvr to eat at the offrs' mess?
- A. No, not usual.
- I suggest to you that the usual time for the dvr to go for the water was immediately after the evening meal.
- A. The time varies in every position, whether we are on our own, or whether the CBO Staff is attached to us.
- Q. Could you make a general ruling?
- A. No sir.
- Q. In this position here could you give me any time that it has been in the last few days.
- A. Around 1630 or 1700 hrs. I couldn't say exactly what time.
- Q. You couldn't say whether he ate before he went or not?
- A. No sir.
- Q. Would it have been unusual if Foster had been in the practice of going for water in the neighborhood of 1800 hrs?
- A. No, not umusual.
- Q. And if he had gone at 1800 hrs he would have had time to have his evening meal and then go for water?
- A. Yes, around 2100 to 2200 hrs.
- Q. In your capacity as Duty NCO have you anything to do with the vehicles of this HQ.
- A. Yes.
- Q. What powers are delegated to you in the despatching of vehs?
- A. If I find it necessary to get a veh to go anywhere I could delegate someone else to drive another man's vehicle.
- Q. It is quite possible for some drivers to have driven another man's veh quite often during a few days?
- A. It is not usual.
- Q. Would it be an exception for a driver other than the driver to whom the veh is charged to, to drive that vehicle?
- A. No sir,
- Q. The vehs are charged to one driver?
- A. Right sir.
