On 11 Dec. 42 I turned out the laundry of Mr. Loblanc and a slip with Sgt. Courmieu's name fell out. This was a slip from Loblanc's laundry in Brighton. It fell out with the clothes. I produce a bag (Exhibit H) which I recognise. It was given to me by my husband, Albert Edward Taylor who collects the laundry. I have received laundry from Mr. Loblanc before. As a rule it consisted of one or two towels, a set of underwear, a shirt and sometimes socks. This time there was more laundry than usual: 3 towels, 6 vests 5 pr. of pants, 4 handkerchiefs and 1 stick 4 pr. of socks. On ^{which} Loblanc's laundry I have my own private mark. I put on the laundry. On the other clothes there was another laundry mark H215. I had a conversation with Mr. Loblanc, whom I recognise on 16 Dec. 42. regarding the laundry. I asked him what the laundry slip was doing in his bag. He asked me if I had still got it. I got up to look for it but unfortunately I couldn't find it. He then said if I found it would I destroy it.
