The greatest of vigilance is required to pret their introduction; and acquaintance with methods and unceasing ef are necessary to their eradication. Reports from many sections through the province indicate that the farmers have slackened their efforts tows eradication during the past two seasons. The chief reason for this is t labor has been so very high that farmers hesitated to employ men at we that does not give some immediate return. Then, again, there are a few farm in every locality who never have given much, if any, attention to the prev tion of the spread of noxious weeds. This is discouraging to the farmer has been making an effort to keep his farm clean.

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The Department wishes to sound a note of warning that unless farm use every care in the selection of their seed. especially the clover and greed, and also make an effort to prevent the further spread of weeds, result will be most disastrous to the agriculture of the province.

THE DESTRUCTION OF WEEDS.

One of the great secrets of success in fighting any class of weeds is commence the fight as soon as the weeds appear, and not allow them to b commence the ngnt as soon as the weeds appear, and not allow them to be come well established all over the farm before any serious effort is made to eradicate them. When some of our worst weeds, such as wild oats, will mustard, perennial sow thistle, bind weed, couch grass, etc., have become distributed all over a man's farm, it would cost almost the price of the farm to thoroughly eradicate them. If they are taken in time, however, the chances for keeping them in check are much better. In any case, efforts keep weeds in check should never be relaxed, and while it may seem up-hi work at the same time well directed effort for a number of years will agent work, at the same time well directed effort for a number of years will ever tually lessen the number of weeds on the worst infested farm, though it probable that more than a lifetime would be required to thoroughly eradicat
