VIA TELEGRAPH FROM HALIFAX. LATEST FROM ENGLAND. ARRIVAL OF THE AMERICA.

Halifax, Telegraph Office, Monday, 1 p. m. To E.M. McDonald, Pictou.

Steamer America arrived here at noon yesterday, after a boisterous passage of fifteen days from Liverpool. By this arrival, we have Liverpool dates to 25th December.

Parliament met on the 20th, when Mr. Blyth officially announced the resignation of the Ministry, and entered into a lengthened statement of the causes that have led to that result.

About the Ministry all that is known up to this time, simply because it is all that has been definitely fixed, is that Lord Aberdeen is now the head of the Government, with the entire concurrence of Lord Lansdowne and Lord John Russell, and that Lord John Russell will lead the House of Commons.

Lord Malmesbury has appointed his brother, Captain Harris, to be British representative at Lima, with a salary of £3000 per annum.

The steamer Orinoco at Southampton has South America Mail. Several passengers had died of yellow fever.

French news unimportant. Paris not only quiet but dull.

Liverpool corn markets quiet at last. Week's prices, Western canal flour 28s. 6d., Baltimore, Philadelphia and Ohio, 29s., Canada 28s. 6d. to 29s.

Sugar transactions chiefly confined to refiners; 3,000 bags foreign at 17s. 3d. to 18s.

The America sailed again for Boston at 2 p. m. yesterday.

LORD ELGIN. The Saint Andrew Society of Buffalo dined together at the American Hotel on last St. Andrew's day.

He said that he could not well remain silent upon the announcement of a sentiment so justly complimentary to a noble Scot and eminent statesman. The speaker remembered with delight the elegant and cordial hospitality tendered to other citizens of Buffalo and himself at Toronto, of the distinguished Governor of Canada and his accomplished lady, the daughter of Lord Durham.

I know not how the Governor General would relish the proposed transformation, but well assured I am that no British subject on either side of the Atlantic is more deserving of respect for intellectual superiority and gentlemanly courtesy than that worthy son of Scotia—Lord Elgin.

TWO WEEKS LATER FROM CALIFORNIA. The Isthmus steamers have arrived at New York, bringing California dates to the 21st Dec.

The rainy season had closed, and travelling on the Isthmus was good, passengers being able to cross in twenty-two hours.

On the evening of the 4th, the city of Anapulo was visited by a terrible earthquake, and a number of the largest buildings were destroyed. Continued shocks were being felt up to the period of the steamer's departure.

Acapulco. Thirty buildings were ruined; loss \$200,000. A very severe shock was also felt on 8th, and a repeated shock on the 9th.

There was an unusual amount of sickness prevailing at Anapulo.

The mining prospects in the winter diggings were never more favourable for an abundant yield. The rains had been very favourable for mining.

The Indians in the south were becoming restless again. Lieut. Deal, superintendent of Indian affairs, was to leave on the 30th ult.

Show had fallen in many places, and in some localities was four feet in depth.

The city of Sacramento had been nearly rebuilt, and many fine brick buildings had been erected.

Capt. Wright and party had a battle with the Indians in which thirty of the latter were killed. The result of the presidential election was not known in California.

We are informed that an Eastern company has been organized for the purpose of constructing a canal at Niagara Falls.

SANDWICH ISLANDS.—Dates from the Sandwich Islands are to Nov. 6. One hundred and sixteen whale ships were in the port of Honolulu on the 4th.

The ship Isaac Howland had arrived at Honolulu with four Japanese sailors, picked up at sea from an board a junk in a fishing condition.

The Polynesian says that the past season has been a most successful one for the whaling business. More oil will be received there than in any previous season.

MELANESIAN ACTIVITY.—On Thursday evening last, while two boats, 14 or 15 years of age—owned by Mr. John Weston—the other a son of Mr. Richard Foote—were skating on the ice on Cheongtong River, they both fell through.

ENGLISH BUTTER ON BOSTON BEARD.—There were 1025 cwt of butter brought to this port by the last steamer from Europe. It is generally of the most delicious sort.

Passenger difficulties with Morocco are reported. The Caloric ship Eriessow went on her trial trip in New York harbor on Tuesday morning.

It is rumored that the hon. Wm. Young will resign the office of Speaker on account of ill health.

STATES OF CANO, Dec 27.—Extract of a Letter.—The ship William, of Pictou, Frazier, on board of P. E. Island, bound to Boston, with cargo of 2180 bushels, was wrecked and lost at anchor in the Cove on Friday last.

FRANCE.—Paris news relates wholly to the Emperor's movements. It is truly amusing that His Majesty treated the troops, attended Divine Service, gave the Grand Mass, and on the 24th, in the forest of Compiègne with a numerous retinue.

The marriage of Princess Yass with Prince Albert of Saxony is officially announced, leaving the Emperor a not dissipated son-in-law.

The modifications of the Constitution of France are published. The Emperor is to grant amnesties, treaties of peace, and public works. The Ministry is to vote on the budget. Prince Jerome is to be his presumptive heir.

Care of Good Hope.—The screw-steamer Harbinger, at Plymouth, has dates Calcutta 15th October, and Cape of Good Hope 20th.
