DIVISION COURT

Division Court at Tilbury yesterday offered several interesting cases.

George Crow bought not less than 600 bushels of corn from Walter and Edward Bartlett for 70 cents a bushel. They delivered 140 bushels and then sold the balance to Capt. Stevenson for 75 cents a bushel. Mr. Crow sued to recover damages and was non-suited on the ground that Walter Bartlett, who did the business, was not of age. Judge Houston appeared for plaintiff, and J. B. Rankin contra.

John Rollett sued to recover wages from Frank Goulet. Rollett was hired to work for the late Frank Goulet in 1898. The claim was for wages in 1900. Mr. Rollett put in an account for wages to the Goulet estate. He now sued Frank Goulet for the same account. At least, the accounts were supposed to be the same, but they did not agree. Mr. Goulet produced his books showing that Rollett had been paid and the case was dismissed. Judge Houston appeared for Goulet and F. E. Nelles contra.
