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"Rock of Ages, cleft for me, Let me hide myself in Thee,"

As the poor dying one lay there he must have gone over what he had heard at the mission room so shortly before, when he listened to that hymn, little dreaming of what lay before him e'er he should hide himself in the cleft of that Rock.

"Let the water and the blood,
From Thy riven side, which flowed
Be of sin the double cure,
Cleansing from its guilt and power."

Not only for death, but for life, dear reader. "They drank of that Spititual Rock that followed them: and that Rock was Christ. (1 Cor. x. 4). A Rock for life, and a Rock for death. A living Man in the glory, who is looking down upon you as you read these lines. For your sins, for your sorrows, your trials, difficulties and cares, take Him, and spend a life pointing others to Him. A blessed, glorious life, bringing others to His feet. He is "Jesus Christ, the same, yesterday, and to-day, and for ever."
