The Detroit Tigers are lucky that circumstances prevented them from playing a game in a town where such poor sports exist.

The mayor of Berlin skips the rink which wins the big prize of the Dominion Bowling tournament at Toronto, and he had a big margin 22-8.

Ottawa leads London by three full games and it would not be surprising if the result of the last game on Labor Day would decide the Canadian League championship.

The presence of Umpire Davis was inflicted on Berlin fans yesterday on the principle that where teams are drawing big gates there are no crowds for an umpire like Davis to kill.

They claimed—falsely, of course—that St. Thomas had been offered \$100 to cancel the game here, and said this would be more than would be made by the St. Thomas club if a game was played here on that day, 700 being given as the largest attendance possible.

Every time Rube Deneau goes in the box or to bat with the bases full, the nearer he gets back to his job as bell diver. Yesterday he fanned in the third with the bases full—St. Thomas Times.

The New York Giants under McGraw apparently don't know how to slump. They are out sailing in front of the National and it looks as if only a railroad wreck could spoil their pennant chances.

In face of this, the London papers come out with the statement that only 700 people were present at the game. They do this to make good the prediction made in their articles knocking St. Thomas.

ERRORS LOST GAME FOR PETERBORO

Ottawa Won a Bitterly Fought Game by a Score of 3-2.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—In the most bitterly fought game of the season the Ottawas nosed out Peterboro by 3 to 2 yesterday.

With the champions one run behind and two out in the seventh, Bullock singled and dashed to third when Rogers threw fooled Brant. In the first Shaughnessy singled and dashed from first to the plate, when Rogers' boulder went over Brant's head. Trout caught three or four stealing, and would have won the game had Brant not gone to sleep on two or three occasions. Frank Shaughnessy electrified the crowd with a beautiful running catch in deep centre. It looked good for a three-bagger, but the Ottawa manager went over behind Rogers and clutched it successfully.
