



When they took to unrestricted frightfulness they accomplished something more remarkable, which even yet they do not fully compre-hend. Mr. William Archer states it clearly in his little book, "The Pir-ate's Progress." Writing of the Gal-lipoli expedition having had its chances of success reduced by the German submarines, he says that "this may be reckoned the most im-mortant strategic result they have portant strategic result they have achieved, apart, of course, from their conspicuous triumph in bringing America into the war," He regards the U-boat as having been the im-mediate occasion, though not the sole cause, of one of the greatest events in history—the union of the whole English-speaking world in the strug-gle for humanity, democracy and a lasting peace. The reality of that union is shown in the joint action of navies on the sea and armies on the land, and it shines out of the Bishop of London's saying, "Up to now we have spoken of 'our Ameri-can cousins,' but after this we are going to call them brothers and sis-ters forever." Mr. Archer rightly remarks that those who have died in agony through German crimes have at least not died in vain, but that this cannot diminish the horror with which we see a systematic course of murderous piracy such as the world, even in its darkest days, never saw before. Germany's submarines have achieved a unique record in the world's history. But what a blot upon the page!
