

GOWLAND PAYS THE PENALTY

Murderer of Miss Brown Hanged at Morden—Died Without a Tremor

Morden, Dec. 13.—Lawrence Gowland was hanged at 7.47 this morning. The doomed man went to the scaffold without a tremor, and all through the proceedings he showed great nerve.

The hangman's name was carefully kept a secret. He registered at the hotel under the assumed name of G. Nick. He is from Winnipeg, and by his speech a Ruthenian. While on the scaffold he wore a false beard and a moustache, and when the hangings were over he suddenly disappeared from the court house.

Gowland was hanged for the murder of Miss Georgina Brown, whom he attacked at her home and cut her throat with a broken razor.

UNWRITTEN LAW HERE

Saskatoon Jury Acquits Galician Who Shot Neighbor for Divorcing Wife's Affections

Saskatoon, Dec. 13.—The unwritten law has prevailed in Saskatchewan for the first time. Metro Shrope, the man who shot and killed John Mechalschuk last July, was last night acquitted by the jury and this morning he was discharged from custody. The court held that the Galician was justified in going to any length whatever in taking his wife from Mechalschuk. The jury was out only twenty minutes before the verdict was returned, and there was considerable satisfaction expressed by a crowd in the court room when the verdict was announced.

St. Stephen, N.B., Dec. 12.—At a meeting of the provincial opposition party in Charlotte county tonight, C. R. Crimmer, Geo. Clarke, T. A. Hart, and Dr. E. Taylor were nominated to contest the county. The first three are members of the legislature. Charlotte county being the stronghold of the opposition. The county ministerial association submitted a request for the appointment of 25 men to meet a similar number from the government party, and to agree upon a pure election. WESTERN ESTIMATES

Total Expenditure for Coming Year Nearly \$120,000,000—What the West Will get

Ottawa, Dec. 11.—The main estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1938 provide for the expenditure apart from supplementary estimates of \$119,237,091, as compared with \$116,380,027 voted during the previous year.

Items of special interest to the west from the public works department are: Brandon drill hall, \$20,000. Dauphin, public building, \$15,000. Emerson public building, \$35,000. Neepawa public building, \$10,000. Selkirk public building, \$10,000. St. Boniface public building, \$20,000. Winnipeg, \$225,000, of which \$50,000 is for militia expenditure.

Maple Creek public buildings, \$20,000. Medicine Hat, public buildings \$22,000. Prince Albert, penitentiary site, \$50,000. Regina post office, custom house etc \$88,000. Saskatchewan, public buildings, \$15,000. Yorkton public buildings, \$15,000. The harbor and river works included Grand Marais Harbor, Lake Winnipeg improvements to entrance, \$15,000. Harbors, rivers, bridges, general repairs \$6,000. Lowering Lake Dauphin, Red River improvements, \$10,000. Saskatchewan and Alberta river bridges, \$5,000. Last Mountain Lake improvements, \$14,000. Lesser Slave Lake, urgent provisional improvements, \$10,000. Diversion of Old Man's river into its original bed at McLeod, \$8,000.

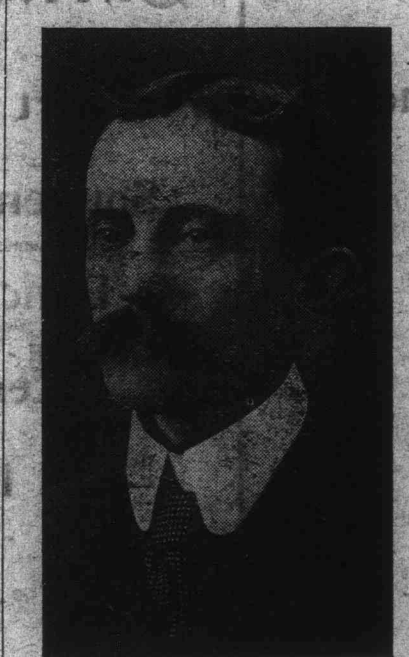
MORE COAL FOUND.
