What he Told the Doctor-Gerald's Interviews With Edgar Morden.

London, Aug. 2.-The examination into the Sifton murder case was continued yesterday. Dr. McNeil testified to being called to the injured man, While he was attending to him, Gerald Sifton came into the room. He was very much affected, and cried:-"My poor father, my poor father. How I wish you could speak to me once more." He asked the witness if he had anything with him to relieve the injured man's sufferings, and the doctor replied "Yes," meaning that he had morphine. Sifton again broke out:-"My poor father, my poor father." Up to this time Dr. McNeil had not expressed his opinion to Gerald of the old man's chances of recovery. "How I hate to see you suffer," continued Gerald, after using the words, "My poor father." "Have you anything to put an end to his suffering?" asked the prisoner, turning to the doctor, who told him the injured man did not need anything, as he was unconscious to all

"If you haven't got it, I have," Sifton said to Dr. McNeil. "I have some strychnine." After a pause he added: -"If money is any consideration-" out the doctor put his hand over Sifto go any further.

When the doctor left he warned those present not to leave Gerald alone with his father. Recently he had a conversation with Gererd.
