COUNTY MEN TO BE KNIFED

City "Liberal" Workers Meet at Irish Jacks and "Arrange Things" for the Convention

City Man Must be the Candidate they Say—Voting Delegation to be Increased for this Purpose

A long and anxious session of the city machine workers of the Sullivan-Ross-Stratton Government was held at the Hotel Rankin, Irish Jack's hostelry, this morning.

The main object of the gathering was to arrange if possible to make to-morrow's convention a cut-and-dried affair so far as the selection of a candidate was concerned. Speakers must also be carefully selected as it was regarded as dangerous to allow too free or too general a discussion.

The local "leaders" have definitely determined that, if Mr. Pardo adheres to his determination to pull out, and the executive is anxious that such shall be the case, a city man must have the nomination. It is said that the rural districts may make a strong bid for representation, and this feeling the city Rossites are planning to squelch. The suggestion of a Wallace County man as distinctly distasteful to them and they will fight any such proposition most strenuously. The strength of County Commissioner Ross in the county has also caused them much anxiety and the city's voting delegation is to be increased with a view to getting rid of any of the township aspirants.

The city workers are now claiming that they do the big share of the campaign work and they should get all the plums. A committee was appointed for the purpose of manipulating the convention and "arranging matters."

Altogether it is expected to-morrow's convention will prove a very interesting affair.
