GRAY'S CHINA HALL.

Best Exhibit at Peninsular Fair. Gray's China Hall Makes Grand Showing.

The exhibit that commanded more admiration than all others at our Fair was the display of J. E. Gray in the Crystal Palace. Occupying a space thirty feet in length by six feet in width and decorated in the national colors, red, white and blue, there was displayed in show cases and on tables goods from many foreign lands.

While some people admired the Japanese china, which is beautiful this year, others fixed their eyes on the fine china from France and England.

The greatest attraction of all was the showing of the old dark blue English dinnerware, with landscape views of old England. This is a special line of Copeland's goods, which Mr. Gray is showing just now, and is having a great run.

The display of new American lamps, Doulton jardiniere, Japanese vases, cut glass flower tubes, was elegant, while the fancy German and Austrian china occupied no mean place in the exhibit. The showing of dinner sets with prices attached should convince anyone where to buy goods in this line.

In one corner of the exhibit was

shown a beautiful line of made in Canada graniteware, of a rich blue mottled color, and this proves a good side line in Mr. Gray's business.

The whole display was skillfully laid out and the richness of the scene was enhanced by the illumination of the lighted parlor lamps, which made everything sparkle.

It is needless to say that Mr. Gray got first prize for his excellent exhibit, besides many compliments on the interest taken in the Fair.
