MARQUIS ITO'S BATTLE

Corea's Cabinet, Except Emperor and Two Ministers, Yields.

His Majesty Orders Assassination of Ministers Who Consented to Japanese Demands, and Then Goes Into Retirement With His Faithful Advisers—Did the Cabinet Yield to Jap Gold?

Seoul, Nov. 18.—(Delayed.)—The conference of nearly a week between the Japanese envoys, headed by Marquis Ito, and the Corea Cabinet ended yesterday and was followed early this morning by a nine-hour sitting at the palace with the Emperor.

At the beginning of today's session, Baron Hayashi declared his determination to withdraw until the four demands made by Marquis Ito were signed. The suspense was ended at 1.30 o'clock this morning, when the Cabinet, with the exception of the Minister of Agriculture and Minister of Foreign Affairs Pakchisun, having yielded, sent for the Emperor and signed the desired agreement. The four Japanese demands were as follows:

- (1) The appointment of a Japanese administrator to govern Corea under the Emperor.
- (2) The appointment of Japanese administrators at all treaty ports.
- (3) Transfer of Corea diplomatic affairs to Tokio.
- (4) No arrangements to be made with other powers without the consent of Japan.

Demonstration by Jap Troops.

Three thousand Japanese soldiers maintained a demonstration all yesterday on the esplanade before the old palace. Japanese troops patrolled the streets all night. The Emperor's palace was also surrounded by troops and the Japanese soldiers and police were lodged in the grounds of the palace. Minister Pakchisun and the Minister of Agriculture continue to hold out with the Emperor against the action of the Japanese. The Emperor, in leading the opposition against the signing of the demands of Marquis Ito, adopted the Emperor with the most powerful argument possible to a superstitious, benighted sovereign, namely, that his consent would affront and outrage all the spirits of his imperial ancestors.

It resulted in Pakchisun and the Minister of Agriculture dramatically denouncing the proceedings and withdrawing to the palace, where they secluded themselves with the Emperor.

Ministers' Lives in Danger.

The Emperor then ordered that the Ministers who consented to the Japanese demands be assassinated. After the signatures and seals were attached, the Japanese military paraded through the city. Baron Hayashi, after securing the consent of the majority of the Cabinet, went from the legation to the palace, where he attempted to convince the Emperor and the two remaining Ministers of the justice of his mission, but failed. He then secured the seals through other Ministers.

Conflict of Authorities Expected.

A conflict between civil and military authorities is now expected; and Minister Hayashi has already sent a strong circular to all Japanese Consuls in Corea to administer justice impartially. The presentation of the Japanese gifts to the court, it is reported that substantial sums of money were used to satisfy the Ministers who consented to the Japanese demands.

About 30,000 Japanese soldiers, billeted on the people or in barracks, are at the service of the Japanese, but no disturbances are expected. The court and cabinet are still closely guarded and protected.

H. G. & B. Wreck; Several Hurt.

Hamilton, Nov. 21.—Three runaway freight cars caused a rather serious wreck on the Hamilton, Grimsby & Beamsville Electric Railway last evening. No one was killed. The injured are: Peter Gibson, Beamsville, motor-man; Luther Cope, Hamilton, motor-man; Dr. Clarke and Fred. Hamilton, Hamilton; Walter Greaves, Stony Creek; a farmer named Overhol, who lives near Beamsville, and a youngster named Cottrell, of Winona. Hamilton's back was badly hurt and the doctors regard his condition as quite serious.

Found Hanging From a Beam.

Toronto, Nov. 21.—James Smith, a driver, who lived at 9 Dundas street, was found hanging from a beam in the stable of H. Galbraith & Co., coal dealers, 11 Dundas street. Smith left his home early, as usual, to go to work. He was 23 years of age, married and had two small children, the youngest 9 days old. It is claimed by his friends that he has been despondent at times and that he was tired of life.

New Trial Ordered.

Edmonton, Nov. 21.—The jury in the trial of Ludwig Lillie, for the murder of William Leslie, was discharged at Brudenheim, could not agree after being out seven and three-quarter hours. Chief Justice Sifton discharged the jury and ordered a new trial for the next sitting of the court.

Pulled Gun From Buggy.

Peterboro, Nov. 21.—William West, a farmer residing near Cavanville, is in Nichol's Hospital. He was removing his gun from his buggy when the hammer caught. The charge carried away part of his shoulder blade and shattered the upper portion of his right arm.

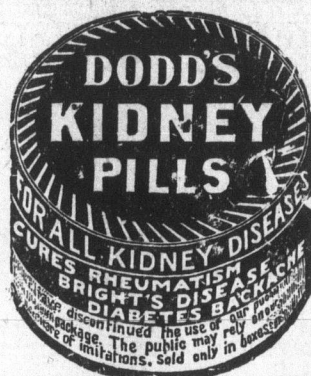
A Spitting Law Enforced.

St. John Steamer Is Burned.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 21.—The steamer Clifton, plying between St. John and Hampton, was burned to the water's edge on Saturday night and the crew and passengers on board had a narrow escape.

Unconscious Eight Months.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 21.—Miss Florence Ryan, 21 years old, woke yesterday from a state of unconsciousness into which she sank on March 7. She recognized relatives and talked to them.

Pope Receives Canadians.

Rome, Nov. 21.—The pope yesterday received in private audience Archbishop Charles Hugh Gauthier of Kingston, Canada, and Bishop Fergus Patrick McEvoy of London, Canada.


