**Crops in Canada.**  
OTTAWA, Nov. 16.—A Bulletin issued today by the Census and Statistics Office contains estimates of the yield, quality and value of the root and tuber crops of Canada during the past season, based upon returns from agricultural correspondents at the end of October. Upon total area of potatoes, turnips, mangolds, etc., hay and clover, alfalfa, fodder corn and sugar beets, amounting to 8,732,000 acres as compared with 9,160,000 acres last year, the total value of the products is \$172,500,000 compared with \$237,700,000, a decrease in value of \$35,200,000. This decrease is caused by the diminution, both in area and yield, of the hay and clover crop, which is less than last year in area by 450,000 acres, in yield by 2,500,000 tons, and in value by \$28,380,000. All the other crops show increases, except alfalfa, the area of which in Canada is relatively small. The yield of potatoes is 8,143,000 bushels of the value of \$22,173,000, of turnips and other roots 87,505,000 bushels, value \$20,713,000, of fodder corn 2,858,900 tons, value \$13,529,000, of sugar beets 204,000 tons, value \$1,020,000 and of alfalfa 310,000 tons, value \$3,610,000. In quality all these crops are marked high, the standard percentage being about 87, excepting for turnips, etc., which are 93 and for fodder corn which is 82. A word of caution is necessary with regard to potatoes, for whilst yield and quality are generally good in harvesting, there are numerous reports of rotting in the cellars, the produce of the heavier soils having been considerably affected by the constant

had a per cent condition of 88. The percentage of fall ploughing decreased upon the land intended for next year's crops ranged from 45 in Ontario to 77 in Prince Edward Island for the East and from 24 in Alberta to 35 in British Columbia for the West. It is remarkable that both this year and last year the seasons in the three Northwest provinces have been adverse to fall ploughing and less than about 25 p.c. of such ploughing has been possible in both years as compared with a normal rate of 75 per cent. In the three Northwest provinces the area summer fallowed this year is estimated as being 1 to 5 per cent more than last year.

**The Fountain Pen.**  
The fountain pen is not an invention of recent years. In Samuel Taylor's 'Universal System of Shorthand Writing,' published in 1786, we find proof of the fountain pen's great age. 'I have nothing more to add,' wrote Samuel Taylor, 'for the use or instruction of the practitioner except a few words concerning the kind of pen proper to be used for writing shorthand. For expeditious writing some use what are called fountain pens, into which your ink is put, which gradually flows when writing. From these into a smaller pen cut short to fit the smaller end of the instrument, but it is a hard matter to meet with a good one of this kind.'

**Meaning of the War.**  
The war in the Balkans is the end of a blood-lead between Slav and Turk that has lasted for more than five centuries. The Bulgarian Empire, which emerged from chaos a thousand years ago, extended from the Black Sea to the Adriatic, leaving the Greek Empires little more than Constantine. Before the Saracens destroyed the eastern Roman Empire the Emperors had great difficulty in holding down their Bulgarian neighbors, who ultimately called the Turks to their aid. In the fourteenth century, the last Czar of the second Bulgarian Empire became the vassal of the Sultan Murad. This did not save Bulgaria from being overrun by the Turks, and in 1393 the last vestige of Bulgarian independence was destroyed. It was almost five centuries before Bulgaria again emerged as an autonomous State. The assumption recently of the title of Czar by the ruler of Bulgaria served notice upon the world that the Bulgars seek once more to become the dominant power of the Balkans and restore the glories of Kaloyan and the great Asen.

**A German Allegory.**  
On a recent trip to Germany, Doctor Harvey Wiley, the government's pure food expert, heard an allegory with reference to the subject of food adulteration, which he contends, would cause Americans to congratulate themselves that things are so well ordered in this respect in Canada. The German allegory was substantially as follows: Four flies which had made their way into a certain pantry, determined to have a feast. One flew into the sugar and ate heartily, but soon died, for the sugar was full of white lead. The second chose the flour as his diet, but he fared no better, for the flour was loaded with plaster of Paris. The third sampled the syrup, but his six legs were presently raised in the air, for the syrup was colored with aniline dyes. 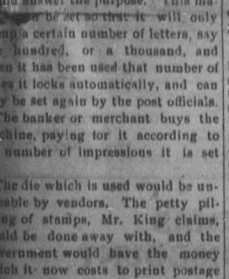
