Notice is hereby given that an application will be made to the Parliament of Canada at the present session thereof for an Act to incorporate a Railway Company under the name of "The Dominion Pacific Railway Company" with power to lay out construct, equip and operate a line of railway from a point on the International Boundary at or near Range twenty three West of the fourth Meridian in the Province of Alberta, thence North Westery via the town of Pincher City to a point on the Crows Nest Branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway at or near Lundbreck, thence Northerly and West of the Porcupine Hills to the city of Calgary, thence Northerly and West of Snake Lake, all Lake and Pigeon Lake to the city of Edmonton, thence in a generally North Westery direction to Fort St. John in the Province of British Columbia, with a branch line from a point on the said main line West of the town of Pincher Creek in a generally South Westery direction and along the South Fork of the Old Man River to the Boundary of the Province of British Columbia; to construct and operate telegraph and telephone lines and to charge tolls for the use thereof; to enter into agreements with other Companies; and also with other usual and customary powers.
