Disaster at Curries' Mill, Brings Instant Death to Little Lad

A fatal accident occurred at Curries mill, Knowlesville, on Monday afternoon about 4.30 o'clock, when Malthe youngest, son of George Whitehouse was instantly killed by a botler explosion.
